

BEES CLEAN BEAVERS FOR 7 STRAIGHT WINS

Salt Lake Shows No Mercy to McCredie's Slipping Outfit.

MORMONS COP DOUBLE BILL

First Pastime Goes 6 to 5, While Number Two Ends 10 to 5. Walker Quits for Business.

SALT LAKE CITY, July 20.—(Special.)—The Bees cleaned up the Beavers 109 per cent in the series, winning seven games. They beat the visitors today, 6 to 5 and 10 to 5. Pitching on both sides was loose, but was considerably better on the Portland side. The first game was featured with a rally by the Beavers, which came within one out tying the score. That was about the only excitement of the day.

The Beavers suffered a further crippling this evening when Frank Walker quit the club to return to North Carolina, where he has a good place with a big tobacco company. The crowd today was the second largest of the season, being second only to that of opening day, and measured better than 5000 paid admissions, which, at Salt Lake means, rolls in big money. McCredie, therefore, is not wholly without solace.

Kenner Pitches Good Ball. Ken Kenner pitched good enough ball in the opening game, but his support started out wretchedly and before he knew it four runs were rung up. Dale was wobbly throughout and everybody expected him to blow any minute. In the second game the Bees walloped Sutherland and Schroeder for 16 fat hits, a lot of them doubles and home runs and such like. The Beavers hit Markle hard enough, but he didn't have time to pitch and the Bees were wielding such a deadly stick.

The first inning of the opening games saw Salt Lake make four. Maggett and Krug singled and Schroeder pitched to Siglin and Walker, an out, told the tale. Smith drove in a runner ahead of him with a homer in the fifth. The Beavers scored on the second on Walker's homer and two in the seventh on three hits. The excitement in the ninth was started by Farmer with a double and Schroeder pitched to bases. Koehler got away with an infield hit and a balk by Dale gave the Bees two runs. The tying rally was on second when Cox flied and Baker, pinch hitting, grounded out.

Runs Roll In. In the second game the Bees counted once in the first and twice in the second. They counted five in the fifth on a single by Maggett, a double by Mulvey, another by Sheely, a single by Johnson and a home run by Mulligan. Doubles by Sheehy and Mulligan, interspersed with a single by Johnson, counted them two more in the seventh. The Beavers scored once in the third and three in the fourth. In that inning Siglin, on with a fielder's choice, was brought in on Cox hit. Maggett made a two-base error on Sutherland's long fly, scoring Cox, and Rader's double brought in Sutherland. A single by Winterall, a double by Spears and a sacrifice fly gave them their fifth run in the seventh.

ST.
