

Thousand Persons Homeless.

Upward of a thousand persons are homeless as a result of the fire. A trail of men, women and children carrying bundles of remnants of clothing autched from in front of the advancing wave of flames started on foot and in vehicles for a six-mile walk to Burkburnett, the nearest large town. Late reports indicated that the loss would run higher than a million dolars. Two score derricks and about 50 storage tanks valued at \$225,000 were burned. One oil company "gusher" late tonight was shooting flames 100 feet in the air.

The havoc in Waggoner City was increased by the bursting of a fourinch high pressure oil line which runs under the main street of the town.

A trench and embankment were thrown up at the end of one of the main streets and the burning off

turned into a creek. The only person known late tonight to have been killed was an aged unidentified man.
