BIG PROFITS IN EARLY DAYS

STEAMBOATS ON UPPER RIVER EARNED FORTUNES.

Forty-Six Years Ago the Colonel Wright Made First Trip and Other Famous Craft Followed.

The unusual interest displayed in the trip of the Mountain Gem is, of course, due to the very important part she has played in the history of the upper river route to the interior. Another factor which adds to the interest is that the majority of the people living in the Pacific Northwest have never seen a steamer of the upper river and do not fully appreciate the fact that in a bygone era the steamboats were plentiful on the upper river.

Boats Earned Big Profit.

The steamers Tenino and Okanogan, appearing in the order named, reinforced the steamer Colonel Wright on the upper river in 1862. Both were built at Celilo and their enormous earnings were decidedly important factors in laying the foundation for the colossal fortunes which the O. S. N. Co. piled up for its stockholders in the early '60s. The Tenino was a much smaller boat than the Mountain Gem, but on a single trip to Lewiston, in 1862, she produced for freight, fare and other items, a net profit of \$10,000. On her up trip, May 12, 1862, the Dalles office alone sold tickets to the amount of \$10,000, and it was a poor trip up the river that failed to return less than \$400 to \$500.

Naturally, in the old days, when "get-rich-quick" concerns were less plentiful than now, these profits appeared very striking, and in October, 1862, the pioneer W. H. Gray, father of the master of the Mountain Gem, placed the Cascadia on the upper river routes. She ran independently until 1863, but finally passed into the hands of the O. S. N. Co. Next on the independent list came the steamer "Kiyus," which was Captain Lewis White's manner of sailing. Captain White, in 1863, followed the Cascadia into the O. S. N. camp. In 1862 the O. S. N. Co. added the steamers Webfoot and Nez Perce to the upper river. The Webfoot was not very successful, but the Chief made a good many fortunes for her owners before she was dismantled at Portland in 1864. The Nez Perce, which ran the service in command of Captain Gray, of the Mountain Gem, and on one trip to the Snake River, she brought \$32,000 worth of gold dust. The next up-river boat was a small propeller, the Celilo, which was built at Celilo for towing on the upper river. She was not much of a success, and was taken to the lower river soon after she was built.

Hard to Fight Octopus.

In 1864, the O. S. N. fleet was increased by the Yakima and the Owyhee, the former being one of the fastest boats that ever ran on the upper river. This gave the company six good boats for the Lewiston-Celilo run to the Yakima. Webfoot, Tenino, Owyhee, Nez Perce Chief and the Okanogan. No additions were made on this portion of the river in 1864, but the Shoshone was built at old Fort Boise at the head of navigation on the Snake. In 1867 another opposition steamer appeared at Celilo for the Lewiston-Celilo run. It was named the Lewiston and was too small in size and power to do much with her big rivals. Like her predecessors that had attempted to fight the octopus, she found her way to the lower river, where navigation was less strenuous. The rush to the Idaho gold fields was the principal factor in bringing into existence the first class Snake River steamers which flew the O. S. N. flag in the early '60s. With the decline of the gold industry the company sent some of its steamers to the lower river, but in 1876 added the Almonta to the fleet. The same year they purchased the original Tenino with a new craft bearing the same name. A year later the Yakima was replaced in her place by the Annie Faxon, which exploded her boiler and became a total wreck about ten or 12 years ago. The same engine was used on the Yakima the crack boat of her time were placed in the Annie Faxon and are today doing duty in the steamer Lewiston. The steamer Spokane was built at Celilo in 1877. Opposition had been absent from the upper river for several years when in 1877 the Small Brothers built the steamer Northwest at Columbus. She remained independent about as long as her predecessors, and in 1878 the inevitable O. S. N. flag trailed from her jack-staff. In size and equipment the steamboat service reached its height in 1878 when the Catalina Harvest Queen and the John Gates were launched at Celilo. The Queen was the finest steamer that ever ran to Lewiston, and in after years performed excellent service on both the middle and lower river. The John Gates was started on her career in command of Captain W. P. Gray, now of the Mountain Gem, and she was the first steamer of the Canadian Pacific's Big fleet at Victoria, was in command of the Harvest Queen.

1878, was practically the last of the O. S. N. steamers to take the water at the famous Celilo yards, and was also the last to leave the upper river, remaining there until 1888, when Captain Troup brought her down to The Dalles. A year later the Northern Pacific Railroad built the Frederick Billings at Celilo for use as a transfer boat at Pasco, pending the construction of the bridge across the Columbia. She never cut much of a figure in the carrying trade on the river and was wrecked about three years ago coming down the Columbia in Paul Mohr's portage road service. She was dismantled and her machinery is now driving the Charles F. Spencer up and down the river. The steamer mentioned in this article was one of the pioneer fleet which played such an important part in the early development of the country. It was early in the life that the company began to disintegrate, and the river or dismantling them, as their days of usefulness ended, and with the completion of the O. R. & N. rail lines to the upper country, the golden age of steamboating which will not soon be forgotten. BREAKS RECORD ON RUN CHARLES R. SPENCER'S SPEEDY VOYAGE DOWN RIVER.

Idaho Excursionists on the Boat Pass Set of Records on the Portage Road.

Veteran of the First Road.

THE DALLES, Ore., June 2.—(Special.)—Perhaps no one who took the trip from The Dalles to Celilo yesterday via the portage road was more interested spectator than John Carey, of this city, who more than 40 years ago, was one of the engine crew which hauled the first train over the first bit of railroad ever built in Eastern Oregon over this same route. Mr. Carey is a native of Cork, Ireland, and came to The Dalles in 1861, entering immediately into the employ of the O. S. N. Company. For some years he acted as fireman on the engine J. C. Alworth between Celilo and the Dalles, serving also on the company's steamers on the upper and lower rivers. He was a member of the crew which, under Captain Blum's command, first brought the steamer over Celilo Falls, the first boat ever taken over those waters. One of Mr. Carey's valued possessions is a pipe from the Dalles to Portland, issued to him on January 14, 1865, by W. B. Bradford, on the steamer Wilson G. Hunt, and also his ticket on the same steamer with the Dalles-Celilo portage road, now living at San Rafael, Cal., all the members of the old railroad crews in which Mr. Carey served are no longer living.

NEW YORK, June 2.—Counsel for James H. Hyde issued a statement this afternoon outlining the position of Mr. Hyde with reference to the attacks made on him. The statement follows: "The resolutions passed at yesterday's meeting for a selection of the chairman of the board, and requesting Mr. Hyde to trustee his stock, contained nothing that was new, and which would be taken from the outset of this unfortunate and unnecessary controversy. Mr. Hyde had offered again and again to transfer his stock for a limited term under proper restrictions, so as to secure a board of directors which will be composed of persons who will be able to handle the public good with fearlessness and independence, although it would be difficult to find a more representative body of men than those constituting the present board. Mr. Hyde may well be commended for his disinterested efforts to bring about a relief from further duty."
