MAYOR VALENTINE ARRESTED.—Mayor Valentine, J. B. New, E. O. Magoon, Knight & Glover, Al Harris and Councilman W. W. Raser, of St. Johns, were brought before Recorder Thornyke yesterday on a charge of violating an ordinance which provides that no slot machines shall be operated in St. Johns for gambling, whether it be for money, checks or goods. The Recorder found this ordinance and decided to enforce it, and the warrants were issued. The men arrested appeared before the Recorder and said that they would remove their machines. It is expected that at the meeting of the Council Tuesday evening an ordinance may be passed licensing slot machines by the month. Councilman King also was haled before the Recorder on charge of permitting his vacant lot to become covered with rubbish. Councilman King appeared before the Recorder and his sentence was suspended to give the ex-Mayor a chance to clean off his lot, and escape the penalty of the ordinance, which he had caused to be passed by the Council.
