Decision Affecting Interstate Commerce Law.

MUST UPHOLD CONTRACT

Supreme Court Holds Road Cannot Change Rate Charged After Making Agreement to Carry Goods at the Published Schedule.

OLYMPIA, Wash. April 4.—(Special)— the Sopreme Court today rendered an important declaion in a controversy con-erning shipping rates in a dispute as to

cerning shipping rates in a dispute as to the application of the interstate commerce law. The case was the suit of the Park-Pisher Company, against the Great Northein Rallway Company to recover possession of a bill of goods from Norway, consigned to the Park-Pisher Company at Seattle.

Under the Interstate Commerce Commission law, rallroads are compelled to keep posted a tariff schedule at all stations. This schedule posted at Seattle aboved that the rate on canned goods from Stavanger, Norway, to Seattle was Scients per 100 pounds; and on cheese \$1.31 per 100 pounds.

The Park-Pisher Company purchased \$3 cases of canned goods at Norway, having

per 100 pounds.

The Park-Fisher Company purchased 53 cases of canned goods at Norway, having a total weight of 38.732 pounds and three cases of cheese, weighing 115 pounds. A contract was entered into with the Great Northern to bring these goods to Seattle under the published rates. Upon arrival at Seattle the company tendered to the railroad \$35.5, which included freight and customs charges paid by the railroad. This amount was refused, the carrier claiming \$44.85, which Fisher refused to pay. The railroad chained that the best ocean rate it could get was \$3.7 cents per 100 pounds, making a total of \$1.3. The Superior Court of King \$500nty found for the railroad, which filed a carrier upon the consignment and judgment was rendered, giving the railroad possession until the full amount asked for was paid. From this the appeal was taken.

The Supreme Court reverses the judgment of the lower court and holds the railroad to the original contract. The lower court is instructed to enter judgment in favor of the appellant, giving them possession of the property, upon their paying the railroad \$23.66. Justice Rudkin filed the dissenting opinion.

Be Sent Out From Alaska. SEATTLE: April 4.—J. F. Baron, president and master of the Thlinket Packing Company, operating a cannery at Funter Bay, Southeastern Ainska, estimates that the pack of the salmon canneries of Southeastern Alaska will be approximately 1,000,000 cases this season. Mr. Baron is the largest independent operator in Alaska. He will nock about 73,000

operating in the North with the exception of the Alaska Packers' Association.

The estimate of Mr. Baron is about 25,000 cases larger than the pack of 1907, which is due to the construction of new causing plants in the North. Sound cannerymen are engaging in the business in Alaska this season, owing to the short run of sockeyes which will mean the closing of a number of Sound canneries this year.

OLYMPIA, Wash, April 4.—(Special)—Amended articles of incorporation were filed by the Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railroad today with the State Secretary, increasing the capitalization from \$5,09,090 to \$25,090,090. The increased capitalization was authorized at a regularly held meeting in Vancouver, Wash, April 3. Francis R. Clark is president and M. P., Martin secretary, while the trinsfees are named as President Clark, J. C. Flanders, H. C. Nuit, M. P. Hartman shell L. C. Gliman.

The direct connection of the North Bank line with the Great Northern and Northern Facilic roads is shown by the financial statements included in the amended articles. It is stated that the whole debts and liabilities of the road amount to M1.225.719, of which the Northern Pacific Railroad has also advanced \$25,09,917, and the Great Northern has advanced \$15,112,032, while the Astoria & Columbia River Railroad has also advanced \$25,00,917, and the Great Northern has advanced \$15,000, All other liabilities, including percentages to subcontractors and the like, amount to M.C.,763.
