

# STATEMENT NO. 1 HAS NO MAJORITY

Its Forces Will Control Senate and Lack Only Six Votes in House.

## ONLY THREE ARE NEEDED

Senator Ray, Who Is Conditionally Pledged, May Decline to Vote for People's Choice for United States Senator If Democrat.

A majority of the Republican candidates nominated for the Oregon Legislature last Friday ran on anti-Statement No. 1, which means that if the ten hold-over Senators, the Statement forces will control the State Senate by election of the new Republican nominees for that body. In the House, the Statement forces will lack six of a majority should they elect all their Republican nominees.

In joint assembly they will lack three of a majority should Senator Ray, who is conditionally pledged to the June election choice for United States Senator, act with the Statement forces. If he should refuse to vote for a Democratic United States Senator, in case he would have to, the Statement men would lack four of a majority.

In the April primaries legislative candidates were nominated as follows:

The hold-over Senators pledged to Statement No. 1 are nine in number, or including Senator Ray, ten. These are the same men who, with the two others nominated for the Senate, give the Statement ranks 15 members out of 26, or two more than a majority. The Statement candidates nominated for House number 25, and the seats in that body number 30.

**Forces Evenly Divided.**

It thus appears that out of the 25 Republicans nominated for the Legislature, 22 are pledged to the June election choice for United States Senator, and that should all the Statement candidates be elected, the number, increased with ten hold-overs, will give the Statement ranks 47 out of 90 seats in the legislature.

These primary election results appear in the returns from the several counties. The names throughout the state, while not yet available, have been reported for months, where until this time, the results without much room for error.

Whether this close approximation to a majority of the Legislature will stir the Statement No. 1 forces to put up independent, or citizens' or Democratic candidates against weak anti-Statement nominees, will be a matter of some concern to the opposition.

### VOTES OF H. M. CAKE.

In the camp of the Statement candidates in this county it was declared yesterday that no such effort would be made. H. M. Cake, Republican nominee for United States Senator, asserted positively that he would oppose any such nominees, and said that the anti-Statement position had as much right on the Republican ticket as the Statement can-

candidates. That Democrats are looking for the movement was openly avowed in their ranks.

### Ten Statement Holdovers.

The ten hold-over Senators pledged to Statement No. 1 choices are as follows: T. H. Kay (conditional), of Marion; M. A. Miller, of Linn; D. H. Bingham, of Lane; L. H. Stoltz, of Jackson (Dem.); A. J. Johnson, of Benton; F. H. Caldwell, of Yamhill (Dem.); J. G. Hedge, of Clackamas (Dem.); A. A. Bailey, of Multnomah; W. T. Rumble, of Clatsop; C. J. Smith, of Umatilla (Dem.).

When a candidate two years ago, Senator Kay signed a statement, pledging himself to support the people's choice for United States Senator—in this instance to hold over to vote conditional that a man be deemed unfit. Yesterday he announced that if Cole should be the people's choice, he would vote for him, but refused to say positively that he would vote for Chamberlain. He believes the people of Marion County have not endorsed Statement No. 1.

Three hold-over Senators are unpledged: D. H. Wood, of Washington; the count complete and official; John B. Coffey, of Multnomah (count also complete); W. N. Barrett, of Washington; Yamhill; Tillamook; Lincoln; Lake, in both of which districts the count had proceeded far enough to show the name of the candidate. Those four nominees opposed to Statement No. 1 are reinforced by three unpledged: L. L. Jewell, of Josephine; Jay Bowerman, of Gilliam; Sherman; Wheeler, and C. W. Parish, of Grant. Harney, Malheur, Bowerman is having a somewhat close race with G. H. Applegate, of Gilliam; and C. W. Parish with J. L. Sitka, also Republican voters' choice. It thus appears that five hold-over Senators and seven nominees oppose Statement No. 1.
