



SETTLES FOR IDAHO LANDS Government Will Pay State \$25,708 in Commissions.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Oct. 10.—The General Land Office has adjusted its account with the state of Idaho showing net proceeds from sale of public lands for the fiscal year ending June 20, 1908. Receipts were \$538,157, of which amount \$460,044 was received from which amount \$499,94 was received from sales of public lands; \$78,112 from fees and commissions. The commissions paid to register and receivers of local land offices amounted to \$257 and total expenses amounted to \$25,70, making the net profit proceeds \$43,341. Of this amount the state is entitled to 5 per cent or \$21,717.
