FEDERAL TROOPS HURRY TO JUAREZ

Trains Loaded With 1000 Men. Guns and Ammunition on Way From Chihuahua.

MADERO TALKS OF FIGHT

He Says Movement Violates Truce and if Report Confirmed, He'll Attack Juarez-Scouts Sent Out to Learn Facts.

CHIHUAHUA, Mex., April 25. Laredo, Tex. April 13.—More than 100 freight cars loaded with 1000 federal iroops and equipment left here over the Mexican National Railroad today for Juarez. The troops are commanded by Generals Rabagueand Oro and are

by Generals Rabage and Oro and are provided with guns and ammunition for heavy action.

Since Sunday gangs of workmen, under military guard, have been hurriedly repairing the railroad north of here and today it was to be repaired as far north as Saux, 30 miles. The troops were to take the train as far as Sanx and from there march overland to Juarez.

No efforts are made here to conceal the expectation that before they reach Justez the federal troops will be encountered by the insurrector and that

a serious conflict will result.
The movement of the federal reinforcements northward was being expedited in Chibushua just at a time when officials were giving out in-formation that an armistice was being

REBELS ARE ACTIVE IN SONOBA

Regiment of Insurrectos Marching South Despite Peace Conference.

South Despite Peace Conference.

DOUGLAS, Ariz, April 3:—Despite peace negotiations at El Paso the rebel activity in the State of Sonora, across the horder from here, continues unabated. Today a hand of insurrectos, numbering between 500 and 1000, were reported marching southward toward Moetesuma from the country around Nacosark 3 miles southwest of Douglas, Major Luís Barron, commanding the furales at Agua Prieta, left there with 300 picked men in pursuit, following the receipt of information of the rebel movements. It is believed that Juen Cabral is the leader of the rebels and that the furces of Barron and Cabral will come together near Fronteras.

Many of the rebel leaders of Sonora, including Antonio Garcia and Giron, have been in El Paso conference.

15 to 60 men, are roving the country, most of them sacking leaders.
