

# FEDERAL TROOPS HURRY TO JUAREZ

### Trains Loaded With 1000 Men, Guns and Ammunition on Way From Chihuahua.

## MADERO TALKS OF FIGHT

### He Says Movement Violates Truce and, if Report Confirmed, He'll Attack Juarez—Scouts Sent Out to Learn Facts.

CHIHUAHUA, Mex., April 23, via Laredo, Tex., April 23.—More than 1000 freight cars loaded with 1000 federal troops and equipment left here over the Mexican National Railroad today for Juarez. The troops are commanded by Generals Rabago and Oro and are provided with guns and ammunition for heavy action.

Since Sunday gangs of workmen, under military guard, have been hurriedly repairing the railroad north of here and today it was to be repaired as far north as Sanz, 30 miles. The troops were to take the train as far as Sanz and from there march overland to Juarez.

No efforts are made here to conceal the expectation that before they reach Juarez the federal troops will be encountered by the insurgents and that a serious conflict will result.

The movement of the federal reinforcements northward was being expected in Chihuahua just at a time when officials were giving out information that an armistice was being prepared.

## TRUCE DECLARED VIOLATED

### Madero Will Attack Juarez if Federal Troops Move.

EL PASO, Tex., April 23.—The Chihuahua Bulletin stating that 1000 troops left there today for Juarez caused great excitement in the revolutionary camp.

"If the report is true, and we can confirm it, that moment we'll attack and take Juarez," declared General Madero. "It may be that Chihuahua has not been informed that the armistice was extended for another five days yesterday, and that the troops, if they have been dispatched, will be recalled as soon as the mistake is discovered."

General Navarro, at Juarez, was without information as to the alleged reinforcements. General Madero telegraphed to the City of Mexico, and in reply was told that the government knew nothing of the movement of troops from Chihuahua.

General Madero was unable to get a telegram of inquiry through to Chihuahua.

According to General Madero, a movement of troops from Chihuahua in any direction would be a violation of the armistice.

"It makes no difference in what direction they were sent," said General Madero, "even if to a point outside the quadrilateral covered by the armistice. Chihuahua itself is within the quadrilateral, and there can be no military movements to or from the city under the terms of the armistice."

Madero has scouts stationed at 25-mile intervals between here and Chihuahua, but, even by the fastest riding, they could not bring the information to camp in less than 72 hours, it is said.

Of the alleged interview with Vice-President Corral, Madero had this to say:

"I am not sure that Corral made the statement credited to him in a newspaper, but I do know that when the revolution was in its formative stage it was a *dis-courtesy* to spread the impression that the United States would intervene in behalf of the Mexican government. This was to make us appear ungrateful. However, the revolution got under way and is winning, yet there has been no intervention. The government therefore is now trying to make it appear that the revolution does not owe its spread to the unpopularity of the administration, but to foreign elements, which they have come to the aid of the uprising."

When the revolutionists learned that the Chihuahua telegram had been sent four days ago, it lost its importance and the excitement subsided. A business man of Chihuahua who left that city by automobile last Thursday and arrived here tonight stated that the federalists there were observing the terms of the armistice very closely. However, he said, are being moved anywhere.

## REBELS ARE ACTIVE IN SONORA

### Regiment of Insurgents Marching South Despite Peace Conference.

DOUGLAS, Ariz., April 23.—Despite peace negotiations at El Paso the rebel activity in the State of Sonora, across the border, continues unabated. Today a band of insurgents numbering between 500 and 1000, were reported marching southward toward Moctezuma.

Major Luis Barron, commanding the rurales at Agua Prieta, left there with 200 picked men in pursuit following receipt of information of the rebel movement. It is believed that Juan Cabral is the leader of the rebels and that the forces of Barron and Cabral will come together near Fronteras.

Many of the rebel leaders of Sonora, including Antonio Garcia and Giron, have been in El Paso conferring with Madero. Garcia has returned to Sonora from El Paso bearing a new commission as chief of the rebel force.

Hundreds of rebels, each numbering from 15 to 20 men, are roving the country, most of them seeking leaders.

## ATTACK BEGINS ON MAZATLAN

### Rebels Are Stronger, but Federals Are Well Entrenched.

TUCSON, Ariz., April 23.—A special from Mazatlan, the big Pacific port of the State of Sinaloa, Mex., today says that the rebel army which has been threatening that port for some time began an attack upon the city at 11 o'clock this morning. The fighting was severe for the first half hour, and resulted in the rebels continuing until daylight.

Reports tell almost everywhere in the city. No Americans were killed or wounded.

A Southern Pacific locomotive in Mazatlan was struck by a shell and slightly damaged. Telephone wires were cut in many parts of the city as reported down.

The news of the fighting at Mazatlan today was confined to a dispatch received by Colonel Rhea Randolph, vice-president of the Southern Pacific lines in Mexico. The rebel strength is not stated, but they are believed to outnumber the Federals in Mazatlan, who have 200 men with machine guns and plenty of ammunition and are strongly entrenched.
