

BULGARS TO COUNT COST AFTERWARDS

Frederick Palmer Finds People Rejoicing, Not Knowing Fate of Loved Ones.

ARMIES RACE FOR PLACE

Greeks, Serbs and Bulgarians in Marathon to Salonika—Pass to Front Granted American Correspondent.

SOFIA, Nov. 2.—(Special.)—The bells of every church throughout Bulgaria summoned the people this morning to a mass of thanksgiving, largely attended. This is practically the only celebration of the victory of Lule Burgaz illustrative of the Bulgarian attitude. Gushing correspondents who sent telegrams telling of imaginary excitement and rejoicing drew the displeasure of the censors. The only appearance of excitement is in the crowds around the bulletin boards at the war office, watching for news of the fall of Adrianople, which is rumored. Unlike the Japanese censors, who allow all rumors from the Bulgarians permit only officially assured facts.

The only cheering I have heard since I have been in Sofia was for the departing Macedonian and Bulgarian volunteers. Every town taken over the border means more Bulgars hastening into Bulgaria to join the army groups. These hardy Macedonians are seen frequently coming into town.

Casualty Lists Not Published. Of those who gave their prayer of thanks at the churches this morning, unless they had heard through friends at the hospitals, none knew whether their relatives at the front were killed, wounded or living. No official lists are sent out, nor do the people complain. Costs can be counted after the object is gained.

All Macedonian and later drafts of troops are rushed to Adrianople, while the Bulgarian first and second armies confront the Turks at Tzibard. All reports from the Saloniki region indicate that Turkish opposition is fading away, companies are disbanding and soldiers are throwing away their rifles.

Armies Racing for Place

Two Bulgar divisions moving south have joined in the valley of the Struma, below Neurskop, and expect to arrive at Saloniki, but the Greeks, having the start, probably will beat them. Another Bulgar division has joined forces with the Serb division from Uskub and also is in this marathon. Now that a Bulgarian army is putting the Turks out of Europe, perhaps we may have a legation or at least a consulate here. Instead of one Minister representing three countries, as at our interests are in charge of the British, our native Vice-Consul being at the front fighting.

I arrived to find a staff order positively refusing to accept any correspondents, but Premier Guecheff, when I appealed to him that I had traveled 4000 miles and that America was unrepresented, and his influence with the staff, which made an exception to the rule.

PRINCE AZIZ IS TO BE TRIED

Turkish Commander of Cavalry and 19 Officers Under Charges. CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 2.—It is reported that Prince Aziz, who commanded the Turkish cavalry at the battle of Kirk-Kiliseh, and 19 other Turkish officers will be brought to Constantinople for trial by court martial.

More than 1000 wounded arrived here tonight from Thrace plains. An official dispatch from Saloniki says the Turkish forces which started from Saloniki have formed a junction with the troops at Vardari on the Varidari River.

A column from Yenidiah has succeeded in dislodging the Greeks who occupied a position at Vortokoh, near Vodena, in Macedonia. Numerous prisoners and 10 guns were captured. Turkish forces, according to the advices, have descended from Monastir and turned the Greeks under the Crown Prince.

VILLAGERS ARE TREACHEROUS

Turks Who Fired Under White Flag Will Be Court-Martialed. ATHENS, Nov. 2.—It is reported that the German emperor has sent a letter to his sister, Princess Sophie, the wife of Crown Prince Constantine, which has been communicated to the Crown Prince, congratulating the Greek army on the courage it has shown.

Dispatches from Kosani says that when the Greeks arrived at the village of Inell, a white flag was hoisted. The Greeks suspecting treachery, sent forward soldiers on whom the Turkish peasants opened fire. The Greeks then fired and burned the village. One hundred prisoners were taken and they will be tried by court martial.

MONTENEGRIN LOSSES HEAVY

Report Says 2000 Fell in One of Assaults on Scutari. CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 2.—A telegram from Scutari, dated seven days ago, reports that the Montenegrins in one of their assaults against the town lost 2000 men killed and wounded. It is reported from Kavala, on the Aegean sea, that a Greek squadron has been sighted off Enos at the mouth of the Maritza River in the Gulf of Enos. The Greek warships were conveying several transports and it is believed a landing is contemplated.

Fighting continues along the whole line in the Eastern theater of war, but no details have been made public. CZAR SURVEYS BATTLEFIELD Ferdinand is Cheered by Troops Investing Adrianople. 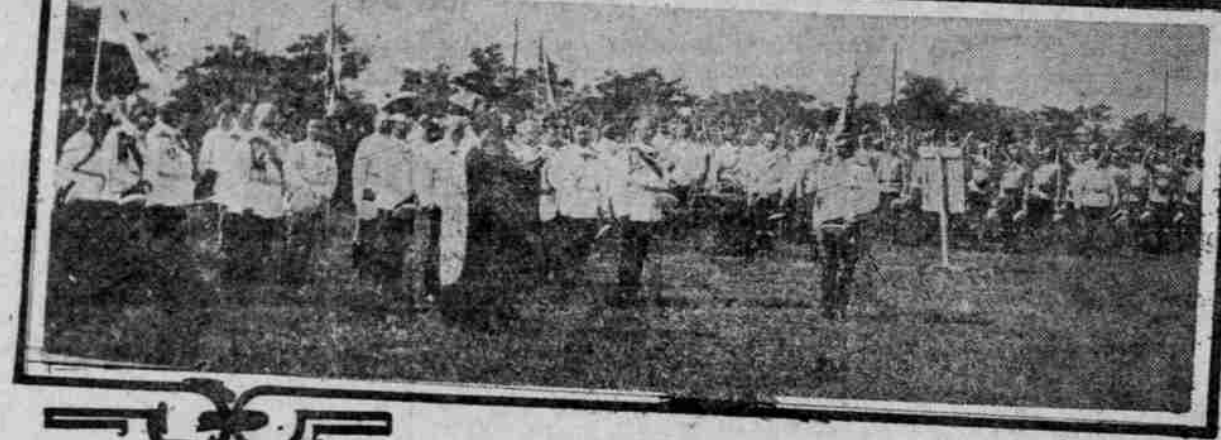

The royal train stopped at Mustapha Pasha, where the Czar attended a thanksgiving service for the Bulgarian victory before Lule Burgaz.

AVIATORS VIEW THE FORTRESS

Bombardment of Adrianople Reported to Be Continuing. SOFIA, Nov. 2.—Persistent rumors of the fall of Adrianople caused great crowds to assemble around the War Office throughout the day. There were also reports that the Bulgarians had captured six Turkish trains near Demotica. No official confirmation of any of these reports could be obtained.

Bulgarian aviators have made several flights over Adrianople and the latest authentic information is that the bombardment of the forts continues.

CARDINAL RESIGNS PLACE

Resplighi Blames Himself for Subordinate's Faults. PARIS, Nov. 2.—The Matin says Cardinal Resplighi, vicar-general to Pope Pius, has resigned, following an inquiry ordered by the Pope into the administration of the chancellor of the vicariate, Monsignor Faber, which it is alleged, established favoritism.

The cardinal, according to the Matin, deemed himself responsible for his subordinate's action and tendered his resignation.

HAWLEY VICTORY SEEN

COMMITTEE SAYS REPRESENTATIVE'S PLURALITY 8000. Replies to Hundreds of Letters Sent Out Show Incumbent Will Be Returned to Congress.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 2.—(Special.)—Representative Hawley's re-election to Congress from this district is predicted by a greatly increased plurality of the 8000 over his nearest opponent of two years ago, in a statement which was issued today by the Congressional committee of the First Congressional District. It follows in part:

"In reply to inquiries sent out by the committee some few days ago hundreds of letters from every part of the First District have been received and all point to the re-election of Congressman Hawley by a greatly increased vote.

"From Curry County and other counties having a great number of homesteaders and other public land entries come the assurance that the voters appreciate the excellent service rendered them by Congressman Hawley in preventing the consideration of the secret report in future cases pending before the department, and that these men, without consideration of party affiliation, are for him. A poll of one of the voting precincts in Josephine County, where public land entries predominate, disclosed that Mr. Haw-

ley would secure 95 votes out of a possible 100 in the precinct, and this condition is believed to exist in other similar localities.

"The dairymen and horticulturists are also strong for Mr. Hawley, as the most active Republican on the committee on agriculture of the House, he has led the fight against all measures, proposing the reduction of the present tax on colored oleomargarine and its substitution for butter, and has strongly contended that no article that is not butter, no matter by what name it is proposed, should be sold as butter. Mr. Hawley has also taken the initiative in the fight against the propaganda carried on by Eastern jobbers, to injure the Oregon apple trade, and has defeated the Lafean apple box bill and other similar measures.

"Congressman Hawley has made it his annual custom to visit every portion of the First District and confer with his constituents. This has been done whether an election was on or not. He has done the same this year, and these visits have kept him in direct touch with all the people rather than a certain favored few. He knows their interests and desires and will receive great majority of their votes next Tuesday."

CHINESE YOUTH STUDENT

La Grande High School Preparing Oriental for Teaching at Home.

LA GRANDE, Or., Nov. 2.—(Special.)—It has just fallen La Grande's duty to aid the Chinese republic in getting out of the long-traveled rut, the La Grande High School now having in training Wong Ying Ho, who is a nephew of

Wong Yet, a local merchant in Chinatown. Wong Ying crossed the Pacific after having mastered the rudiments of the English language and the ordinary branches of education in Hongkong at a Chinese university, and has now entered upon a four years course in the high school of La Grande. He is a bright young Chinaman of about 18 or 19 years and is very ambitious to master the entire course here, then return to China and impart to his fellow countrymen the knowledge obtained in the new world. He is making good progress in school and is a good student.

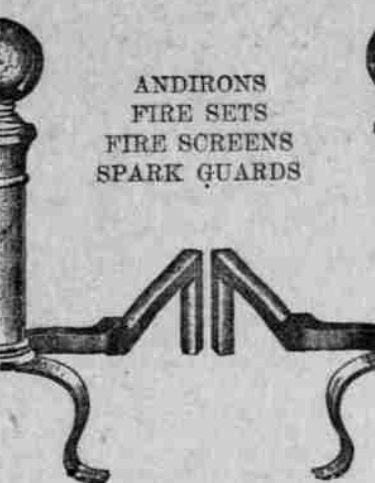
