RUSSIANS TURNED BACK

DEPORTATION CASE SETTLED BY 'POLIOLOGY OF SHIP'S OFFICER.

Widow and Employe of Her Late Husband Must Return to Answer Charge of Murder.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—A deportation case that threatened to bring international complications developed today, when Julia Bokowawa, 27 years old, widow of a wealthy Russian confectioner, and Nikolaj Swotkoff, 24 years old, were sent back to Russia to answer charges of murdering Bokowawa.

The couple obtained today a writ of habeas corpus, which was served on the first officer of the Kurak. He declined to heed the order and turned the matter over to Captain Kirschfeld, of the steamer, who notified the Russian Consul-General. The latter appealed to Federal Judge Mayer.

OLD BURGHERS IN ARMS

Johannesburg Has Appearance of Besieged City—Martial Law to Be Declared Throughout Rand Region Tomorrow.

PRETORIA, South Africa, Jan. 10.—Not since the Boers laid down their arms to the Britons, in 1902, has the Rand been as near a state of war as it is tonight. Martial law will be declared tomorrow.

The proposed mass meeting of the Trades Federation has not yet been prohibited, but the proclamation of martial law probably means that an attempt will be made to prevent a demonstration, which is the present temper of the strikers, who are incensed by the arrest of their leaders.

BULL MOOSE MAY FILE

RULING MADE IN SECOND CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT PROBLEM.

Secretary O'leott, After Hearing Views of Many, Accepts Interpretation of John H. McNary.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—Secretary of State O'leott announced today, after receiving an opinion by John H. McNary, a lawyer of this city, that he would file the petition of any member of the Progressive party for nomination to any office, the political subdivision of which comprises all or one or more of the counties comprising the Second Congressional District, provided it contains any number of signatures of registered members of the party residing in each of the required number of precincts in each of the required number of counties necessary to make a valid petition as required by the primary law.

"The fact," said Mr. O'leott, "that the Progressive party did not have a candidate for Representative in Congress in the Second Congressional District, which comprises the counties of the state east of the Cascades, at the general election in November, 1912, has given rise to some uncertainty as to just how candidates of such party may have their names placed on the official ballots for the primary election on May 15, 1914, as such party must nominate its candidates for all offices on the primary ballot under the primary law, having cast in the entire state more than 20 per cent of the total vote cast for electors of President and Vice-President at that election."
