Mr. Lounsbury was born in Bangor.
Mc. June 3, 1843. He went to Wisconsin, and after the opening of the Civil War enlisted in the Fifth Wisconsin Battery. He participated in the siege and capture of Corinth, the battle of Perryville, the battle of Stone River, the battle of Chickamauga and the famous march of Shorman to the sea. At the battle of Reseach his horse was killed under him and he received a wound that caused him ill-health for the rest of his life.

He was a past commander of Lincoln-Garfield Post No. 3, Grand Army of the Republic, and since his return here he joined George Wright Post No. 1. He also was a member of industry Lodge, Ancient Order of United Workmen, of this city, and became master workman of the iodge.

He was vestryman at St. Stephen's Pro-Cathedral for several years, later transferring to Trinity Church.
