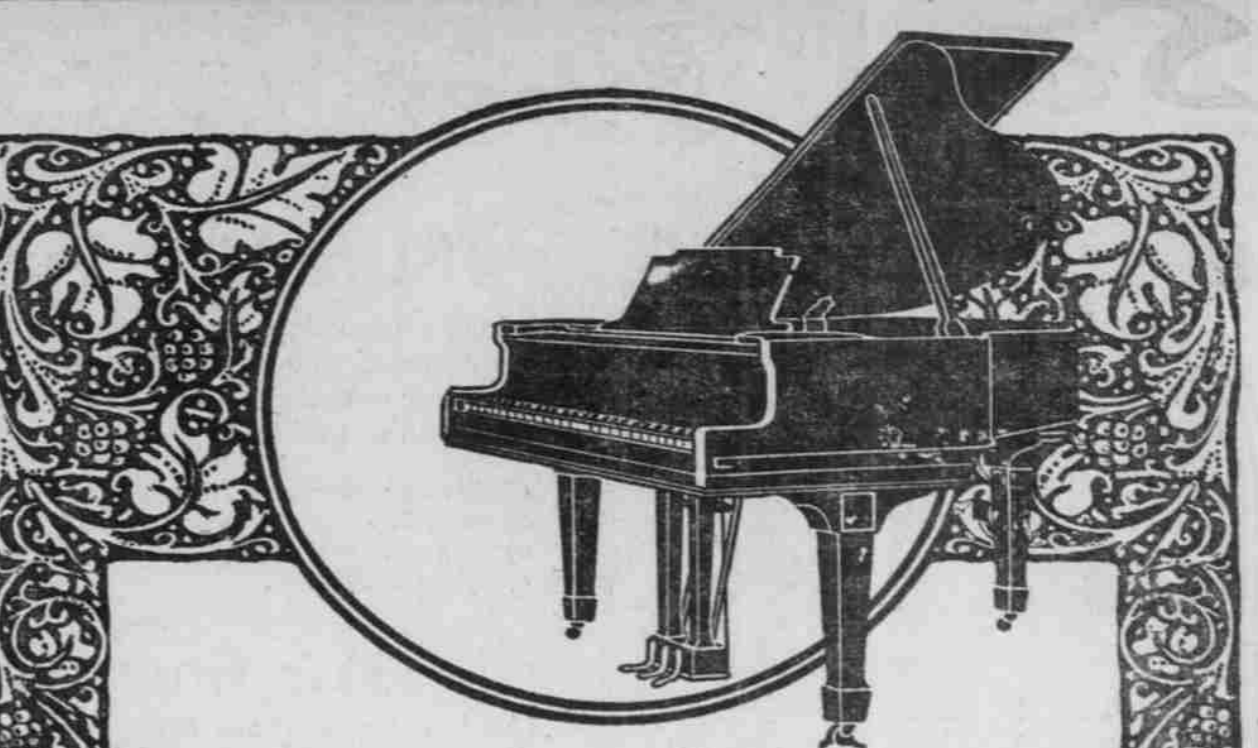
Sharing the honors were the newly appointed officers of the cadet corps and the honor students of the high school, intermediate and primary departments.
