It is certain that the local government and established agencies of relief are unable to cope with the mag-nitud. of the disaster which faces

"Under the circumstances, relief to be effective should be granted quickly. Once more an opportunity is offered to the American people to show that prompt and generous re-sponse with which they have invartably met the call of their brother nations in distress. "The case in China I regard as

especially worthy of the earnest atusual degree the Chinese people look to us for counsel and for effective friendship. Our churches, through their religious and medical missionaries, their schools and colleges, and philanthropic foundations, have rendered China an incalculable benefit, which her people recognize with gratitude and devotion to the United States. Therefore, not only in the name of humanity, but in that of the friendliness which we feel for a great people in distress, I venture to ask that our citizens shall, even though the task of giving is not toway a light one, respond as they can to this distant but appealing cry for
