POSTAL FORCES HAD BIG CHRISTMAS WORK

More Holiday Packages Handled Than in Any Year in History

POST. CLERK KIDDER SAYS

Required Many Extra Helpers in All Larger Offices

Postal workers in Hillsboro and in the Oregon country in general are all unanimous in saying that perhaps no year at Christmas-tide has seen such a volume of mail in the way of packages and postcard and letter holiday greetings. The Hillsboro office was simply swamped and Mrs. Wm. Alexander was requisitioned to help out, but at that it was just a case of too much work for everybody. Mail Carrier Pickens found it necessary to get help to bring in the mail from the trains. For three or four days every foot of available floor space in the office was in use to warehouse the big boxes and packages. It required hours each day to distribute the card and letter mail.

Postal Clerk A. B. Kidder, who runs on the S. P. red car line thru Hillsboro, says that in all his years of service in Oregon he has never had to handle as much Christmas mail as he did in the year of our Lord 1922. He states that the Portland postoffice was swamped and so great was the mail received and sent out that at times it looked as tho the office would cease to function. Many trains with Portland for their terminal came in with as high as five refrigerator cars hot into service to handle the great excess mail.

Mr. Kidder says that the big mail conditions obtained all over the northwest, according to reports from postal clerks coming in to Portland for their runs' end.

All the rural carriers went out of Hillsboro on Christmas Day—and the city carriers had help to deliver the Christmas mail. And at that when the "next day after" loomed up like a blue Monday, there were scores of Christmas packages in the local office—which had arrived on late mails.
