

**BUDGET MEETING**

In this morning call about 300 taxpayers, under the budget for 1923. Then asked Dr. L. W. Hyde to be the chair. The budget as estimated by the committee, were adopted as follows:

This item there was no opinion and it was set aside. Then came the appropriation of health nurse, and many for and against, and of opinions, for and against the session finally the appropriation, 119.

**Agent Retained**—An hour's debate on the part of the county agent which had been on the committee at a total of \$1,500. The committee increase this amount to \$2,000, and then spoke of his motion. Messrs. John Vanderzanden, chiefest opposers of the budget. After practically argument, the vote carried the amendment and for the amount of \$1,500.
