THE RACES.

On last Wednesday the Handicap race over the Baker City Race Course was run between the following horses, for a purse of one hundred dollars:

La Buff's b. g., Lizard;
Ross's yellow horse, Jeff;
Martin's sorrel mare, Emigrant;
Dealy's sorrel stallion, Dave.
The horses got off after one or two attempts. Jeff took the lead, with Dave on his flank, Lizard and the Emigrant Mare bringing up the rear. Before the horses had reached the end of the first quarter, Dave had Jeff collared and continued to draw on him until after they had passed the half mile post where he shot his nose in sight past Jeff, with Lizard some twenty or thirty feet in the rear, but steadily gaining on the two foremost horses, and Emigrant Mare some sixty feet in his rear, which distance was increased until at the outcome the red flag came near catching her. Directly after the horses passed the half mile post Jeff commenced to draw away from Dave, and soon Lizard came up with Jeff, and when they entered the home stretch some pretty running was done, Lizard coming home from a half to a length ahead, Dave third—seventy or eighty feet behind Jeff.—Time, 1:56.

On Thursday the big race between Ross's mare, Maria, and La Buff's horse, Buckskin, came off for a purse of sixteen hundred dollars—single dash of one mile, each horse carrying 105 pounds. The Mare was the favorite, and pools sold at the rate of 10 to \$7.50. The Mare had the best of the start but did not keep it only for a short distance, Buckskin passing her on the first quarter, and maintained his position, the mare having a tight rein held on her until near the three quarter pole, where she was let go, when she passed the horse and came home some thirty or forty feet ahead. Time, 1:52.

On Friday there was a purse race for one hundred dollars, with three entries:
Ross entered y. g., Jeff;
La Buff entered b. g., Lizard;
Parks entered b. g., Buck.
This race was won by Jeff by some forty feet, coming home at an easy gait in 1:55; Lizard second, and Buck third.

On Saturday there was a match race between Ross's horse Jeff and Parks' horse Buck—half mile, which was won easily by Jeff.

After the main race on the three first days there were several scrub races on which considerable money changed hands.

The attendance at the track on Wednesday and Thursday was very large there being some eight hundred or one thousand people present

on Wednesday and from one thousand to twelve hundred on Thursday with quite a number of ladies. The track was in splendid condition.— Everything passed off pleasantly. In the main races it is conceded that the fastest horse won the money—there was no jockeying done in the start or riding. The proprietors of the track, and especially Mr. Coe, deserve great credit for the good condition of the track and the manner in which order was maintained on the track.

On next Saturday the match race for a purse of one thousand dollars, between Ross's mare, Maria, and Sturgill's horse, Wild Weasel—half a mile—will be run. This is expected to be a closely contested race, and pretty running and fast time may be looked for. There are two more races between the Ross horses and the Sturgill horses to come off within a few days the particulars of which we have not been able to procure at this writing.

Small Fruits on the Farm.
Thorough preparation of the soil and clean culture always pay in any locality with the commonest farm crops. In the orchard, a proper preparation of the soil before planting is especially needed, and in the garden, not only thorough preparation of the soil but subsequent good culture are absolutely necessary to success.

Take small fruits, the berries for instance; one man, by constant care and working, will produce large and uniform crops of strawberries, raspberries and blackberries, while others, by the let-alone process, never get enough fruit to pay ground rent, to say nothing of cultivation. Strawberries are usually planted out, haphazard, and allowed to take care of themselves. This, if the soil be tolerable, they are pretty apt to do, and usually cover the ground so thickly with runners as to give small returns in fruit, while, if a little care and attention had been paid to keeping the runners down, and the plants confined to hills, large stools would have been formed, and a large crop of extra berries would have been realized. So with other small fruits, such as raspberries and blackberries. They should have plenty of room. The old wood of the preceding year, already dead, should have been cut out and the new wood topped to three or four feet. This being done, we should have stocky, branching canes, loaded with fruit.

Again, take currants and gooseberries. Too often they are allowed to ramble at will, and over-grow the whole surface of the ground together with the weeds, when by a little judicious pruning they would have been kept in shape and furnished plenty of new wood upon which to have borne fruit. Grapes, on the other hand, are allowed either to grow at will or else they are so severely pruned that nothing is left upon which to bear fruit, when one or two canes, according to the strength of the vine, pruned as to the laterals to three or four buds, would give a full crop of superior fruit.

In the spring all small fruits should be gone over, the ground thoroughly cleaned, and the plants brought into shape, and if thereafter they are properly attended to according to their special wants, which any common sense man may soon find, we should cease to hear the stereotyped cry that small fruits don't pay. There is nothing about the farm garden you do that pays better, so far at least as the wants of the family are concerned, than fruit, and especially so called small fruits. All that is necessary is to give proper attention, at the proper time, and it will be found that the added comfort to the family will pay a hundred per cent. on the cost, to say nothing of improved general health of the family and the consequent saving on doctor's bills.—Western Rural.
