

Friends and Friendship.

The Louisville Ledger says love is, very properly, the passion PAR EXCELLENCE of youth, but that of middle age is friendship. The calmness, the very unselfishness which constitutes its charm for maturity, render it unattractive to youth. The young enjoy the turmoil of the passions as they do the restlessness and activity of the body. They do not heed if the love be selfish or no. On the contrary, if a thought is given the subject they comprehend that it must be selfish; that it presupposes an idol which is not only worshipped for its own sake, but also to the end that the happiness of the devotee may be secured. Love gives truly, generously, but it asks for a return and that with interest. Friendship is no less generous, but it demands less returns, and bears heavier burdens. Love is too ethereal to know anything of burdens; the utmost it can do is to brave the mischances of delay, the doubts of separation, the tyranny of opposing friends, but burdens or personal disaster, never. An attack of small pox is generally fatal—a wooden leg is its grave—and even premature baldness or gray hairs have written its epitaph without delay. As a matter of justice to the sex divine, it must be admitted, however, that these untimely deaths occur more frequently on the side of men than her own, and that her love, being softer, more tender, more ethereal, more moon light in its character, is not prone to die so suddenly as man's, nor for such small cause. Man's love is a fierce, tropical growth, and has more luxuriance if less tenacity than woman's. But all this is not to the point.

Without friends, life is at best but a dreary waste, shelterless and sterile. With them it becomes a garden abounding in as many pleasant resting places and protecting harbors as we have friends to give us sympathy or aid in our times of trouble. They need not be all of one kind, and, indeed, the greater variety the greater pleasure which accrues. We cannot live on one kind of food, either mental or physical, and the rule applies as well to friends as anything else.

There are our affectionate friends who cheer us when we are despondent, soothe us when we are irritable, love us when we are lonely, and at all times give us their sympathy and affection. Financially speaking, they do not do us any good, nor yet in the way of social advancement; but they make a sunshine for us in our dark days, and we feel and know that we cannot carry to them a burden of personal discomfort too heavy for them to share and by sharings to lighten. We love these friends, and they love us, but in general we only seek them when something has gone wrong. They are our refuge when storms, and clouds, and darkness gather round. When the sky is again clear and the bright sun of prosperity shines upon us, we see them no more; but we know that when we want them again we shall find them, with hearts as full of sympathy and as warm with love as when we sat with them alone and they exorcised the evil spirit which possessed us.

Then there are friends whom we are always helping, and who never, by any possible chance, do anything to help us. Perhaps this is the result of circumstances rather than will. If they are women, we have to do all sorts of things, but chiefly matters of business which they can not do for themselves. Perhaps it is professional advice, drawing up deeds, leases and agreements, or giving sound, legal counsel to their probable present displeasure, even if it be their future safety, and so on AD FINITUM—taking care of the poor, soft, gullible, timid, self depreciating, or fiery, unmanageable, hoity toity, and unreasonable beings as they usually are. Every man of business has one or more of these dear helpless fringes dangling from his coat tail. They impede him a little, but he doesn't mind. He has the satisfaction of knowing that he is doing a good work in saving them from themselves and protecting their pathway through the world, and he will have his reward.

Then there are our good friends who cannot resist giving you good advice. At every turn they are down on you with patent nostrums, moral or medical, which, if you will but taste, all will go well with you for the future. And yet they are the very people of whom you would not ask advice on any subject. Not that your reticence brings its reward, for the less you ask the more they give, and if you do not like to confess your obligations or be guided by their superior wisdom, the fault is yours, not theirs. You may incur the sin of stiff necked ingratitude, but they at least are clear from that of shirking responsibility.

Side by side with your advice giving friends, and, if possible, even a greater nuisance, stand your patronizing friends—the people who pat you on the back with a condescending air, and find something in you which almost arouses their admiration. "You have made a gallant struggle—you have done almost well," they feel constrained to announce in their odious manner.—You, whose life has been one long hand to hand struggle with an adverse, opposing fate—a life for which in the agonies of the night, you have had to gather strength and courage to break the angry surges of the day. A life without help, without sympathy, without anything to relieve it from the dead, dark sameness of unceasing toil—a life that has been a

bitter disenchantment, which no one can regild, a lonely combat with no one to strengthen your hands. And yet, this life, so sad, so tragic, lonely and barren as no one but God knows, your portly, prosperous friend,—whose head is little better than that of the esculent which the omnivorous Teuton most yearns for, and whose bowels of compassion are but a weed grown garden patch, with chin in air and nose upturned, desecrates its mournful courage by his hollow praise and empty patronage! Away with such friendship! Rather commend us to the simple soul who steals in upon our loneliness, and with loving eyes showing mute caresses, with tender hands expressing dumb but eloquent sympathy, the friend of our sorrow, the sun of our darkness, true, patient, unselfish, giving all and asking nothing but leave to give.

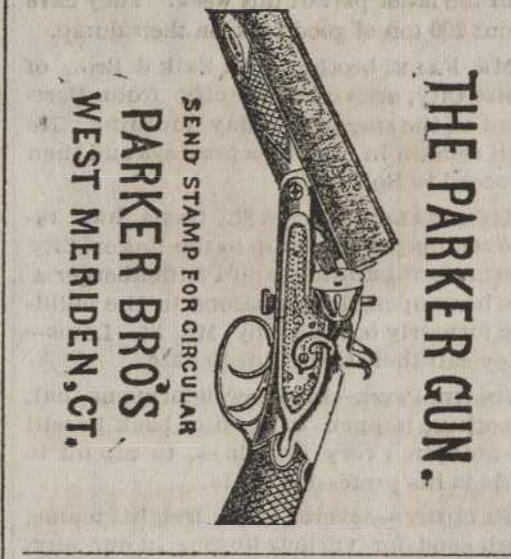
