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The Pacific Coast Midas.

Ten years ago John Mackey was working as a mining laborer in a little exploring shaft in Virginia City. He swung his pick vigorously, and was paid \$1 a day. To day he has a larger income than any other single individual in America, and if his wealth continues to accumulate as it has in the past two years, his fortune will rival that of the richest Rothschild.

Besides that one which may at any time turn up a bonanza. Of the entire business and profits of the firm, Mr. Mackey has a three-fifths interest. The firm owns 66,000 shares of Consolidated Virginia stock, on which they declare a monthly dividend of \$10 a share. Mackey's share of this is \$396,000 a month.

ADD this to the prospective profits of the Nevada Bank, which has just opened with a cash capital of \$5,000,000 and which is the exclusive property of the firm, and you may then figure out the income of Mr. Mackey. The Bank of California paid for years 18 per cent, on their \$5,000,000 capital. The profits of the new bank cannot be less. This amounts to \$900,000, or \$75,000 a month, of which Mr. Mackey's share will be \$45,000.

Mr. Mackey is the most retiring and modest of any of the California millionaires. He lives in Virginia, but his family spend most of their time in San Francisco. He dresses plainly, and might be supposed to be a well-to-do farmer—nothing more. Already the Nevada politicians are moving to make him Senator Jones' successor in Washington.

TWO CLASSES OF QUARTZ CLAIMS are subject to re-occupation. First, those which were located prior to May 10, 1872; second, those located after that date upon which the necessary amount of work has not been done. The time when the work should have been begun on the first class expired on the first of January, 1875. If, however, a claimant has expended \$100 on his claim since May 10, 1872, his claim was not subject to re-occupation on January 1st, and he has the present year within which to make his second expenditure, providing he has complied in all respects with the local laws, this being the effect of a decision rendered by the Land Department last month.

NOTWITHSTANDING the election of Ludington for Governor, Wisconsin should be counted as a Democratic State. Taylor, as Democratic candidate, was defeated by July 24th votes, notwithstanding the Republican leaders sacrificed all the rest of the ticket to elect the Governor. THE WEEKLY SUN. 1876. NEW YORK. Eighteen hundred and seventy-six is the centennial year. It is also the year in which the position House of Representatives, the first since 1856, will be in power at Washington.

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
