The State Fair.

In consequence of the unfavorable indications of the weather, the attendance on Monday was slim, and the prospect for the usual full display in the various departments was not at all encouraging. The principal attraction was a running race, single dash of a mile, free for all, purse \$100. Captain Jack, entered by M. S. White; Sleepy Dave, entered by Wm. White, and Al Straw, entered by Wm. Bigham. Race won by Al Straw, time, 1:55. Immediately after this race the trotting race, double teams, single dash of one mile, for a purse of \$250. L. B. Lindsay entered Mystery and Membrino Pilot, J. J. Welsh entered Olympia Dick and Tinsmith. Won by Welsh's team in 2:57. Total amount of receipts Monday, \$5,767 50.

Tuesday, notwithstanding the unfavorable appearance of the weather still continued, there was a steady influx of people and a large increase of articles in the various departments placed on exhibition. The opening address, by Mr. Wm. Lewellyn, was plain, practical and common sense, and replete with valuable hints and suggestions. The running race to-day was mile heats, three in five for a purse of \$500. A. D. Platner entered Council Bluff, Wm. White entered Sank Owens, J. N. Crabb entered Sydney Barbage and John F. Miller entered Rye Straw. The result was as follows:

It is charged that there was a foul by the rider of Council Bluff, and in consequence there is a great deal of dissatisfaction, and the award of the judges is severely criticised. In noticing this matter the Record says: In the third heat yesterday between Ryestraw and Council Bluffs, we witnessed a bit of foul riding on the part of the "African jockey" on Council Bluffs, that ought to have distanced the horse and ruled the rider forever off this track. We don't understand what the judges were doing not to note the fact. It was plain to every one opposite the horse, in the grand stand. About 20 feet from the string Council Bluffs lead Ryestraw about a head. The rider of Council Bluffs, by a quick jerk of the left rein, threw the left shoulder of his animal against the right shoulder of Ryestraw, causing the latter animal to swerve into the mud and probably causing him to lose the heat. Mr. R. A. Irvine, the Chief Marshal, called the attention of the judges to the fact and asked them to examine the tracks after the race, but they refused to do so. If jockeying is to win the contests of our State Fair, the sooner the racing feature of it is given up the better.

Immediately after the running race came the trotting race, mile heats, best three in five, for a purse of \$250. Alexander Shannon entered Lady Fastina; Wm. White entered Bellfounder; L. B. Lindsay entered Blue Mountain Boy, and B. B. Acker entered Eph Maynard. The result was as follows:

Wednesday morning the polls opened at 9 o'clock for the annual election of officers, and at 10 o'clock the plowing match.

The running race to-day was for three-year-olds for a premium of \$500, \$400 to the first and \$100 to the second; four entries—Olo, Wyannooska, Hard Bargain and Al Straw. The race was won by Hard Bargain, Olo second, Al Straw third, Wyannooska distanced. Time 1:57, 2:01. In the trotting race to-day, mile heats, best three in five, for a premium of \$250; there were two entries. J. J. Welsh entered Tinsmith, and W. Williams entered Bellfounder. The race was won by Bellfounder in three straight heats. Time, 3:10, 3:12, 3:11.

The annual election of officers of the Society took place this afternoon: President, M. Wilkins, of Lane County; Vice Presidents, Joseph Hamilton, of Benton, and John F. Miller, of Marion; Secretary, E. M. Waite, of Salem. Board of Directors: Thomas Smith, of Douglas; George Belshaw, of Lane; Clark Bewley, of Tillamook; G. J. Basket, of Polk; B. J. Morrison, of Clatsop; Wm. Barlow, of Clackamas; Dr. Mattison, of Coos; Columbia, no election; E. Stewart, of Grant; C. P. Burkhardt, of Linn; D. W. Chocoman, of Lake; T. W. Davenport, of Marion; C. P. Bacon, of Multnomah; W. J. Snodgrass, of Union; Hugh Fields, of Umatilla; Wm. Bigham, of Wasco; A. L. Lelling, of Washington; Wm. Brown, of Baker; W. C. Myer, of Jackson; Joseph Hamilton, of Benton; D. C. Stewart, of Yamhill. The receipts to-day amounted to \$1,428 50. The total receipts thus far from all sources are \$8,685 50 which is much less than was anticipated by the managers.

SCARED.—One day this week a tramp who appeared very feeble, and hobbled along leaning upon a cane, went to the residence of St. John Skinner. The doors were shut, but he was seen through the window before he came to the house. He went through the clubbing process a second and a third time before the dog was disabled from following him. This dog has been the guard of a large band of sheep for several years, which is sufficient evidence that the old fellow's excuse was mere pretence. The dog had been trained to hunt wild animals out of the sheep range, and had, doubtless, at the time been after a cougar, as an old cougar and two cubs were seen and one of the cubs caught within a few hundred yards of the place the same afternoon. It was an inexcusable act of brutality, and we understand that the owner of the dog will prosecute.
