

Platform of the Union State Convention.

WEDNESDAY, March 25th. Convention assembled pursuant to adjournment. Committee on Resolutions submitted the following: Resolved, That it is the highest duty of every American citizen to maintain against all their enemies the integrity of the Union, and the paramount authority of the Constitution and laws of the United States, and to preserve, at the ballot-box the fruits of the late war.

Resolved, That the work of Reconstruction of the Southern States belongs to the legislative department of the Government, and that we endorse the thirteenth and fourteenth amendments to the Constitution, and the acts of Congress, commonly called the Reconstruction Acts, as the best plan yet proposed for the restoration of the States lately in rebellion to their former relations with the Federal Government.

Resolved, That we are in favor of admitting the rebel States to representation in Congress at the earliest moment which the public safety will permit. Resolved, That the national debt was necessarily contracted to save the National life, and ought to be honestly paid; and we condemn every scheme devised for the repudiation of the whole, or any part of the debt, as disgraceful to the Republic and unjust to its citizens; and that the proposition to pay in legal tender notes, those debts contracted to be paid in specie, is only a milder term for repudiation.

Resolved, That under the Constitution the Federal Government has no right to interfere with the elective franchise in any State having representation in Congress, and whose civil government is not overthrown by rebellion. Resolved, That the right of expatriation is the natural and inherent right of all people, and indispensable to the enjoyment of the rights of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness; that while the citizen owes allegiance to the Government, the Government owes protection to the citizen, and that it is the duty of the Government of the United States to protect all its citizens—native born and naturalized—in the full enjoyment of their rights as citizens of the United States, wherever, and under whatever color or pretense those rights may be invaded.

Resolved, That the foreign immigration, which in the past has added so much to the wealth, development of resources, and increase of power of this nation—the asylum of the oppressed of all nations—should be fostered and encouraged by a liberal and just policy, and that we sympathize with all people everywhere, who are struggling for civil and religious liberty.

Resolved, That the thanks of the American people are due to the soldiers and sailors of the army and navy, who have periled their lives in defense of their country and in vindication of the honor of its flag, that the nation owes to them some permanent recognition of their patriotism and their valor, and ample and permanent provision for those of their survivors who have received disabling and honorable wounds in the service of their country, and that the memories of those who have fallen in its defense shall be held in grateful and everlasting remembrance.

Resolved, That we are in favor of liberal appropriations of land and money by the Government to aid in the construction of railroads.

Vandalism on New Hampshire.

The result of the election in New Hampshire yesterday again proves the lesson of all history, that in unsettled and revolutionary times, in all countries, and perhaps at all times, in a growing, vigorous country like ours, the bold party is the one which wins. And it is our deliberate conviction that the prompt impeachment, on the one hand, of Andrew Johnson, and, on the other, the sweet alacrity with which he submitted, trusting "in God, the people and the courts," but without "keeping his powder dry," or making any preparation before venturing to provoke Congress to battle—unless, indeed, it was he bought that nitro-glycerine in New York—turned the scale and gave to the Republicans the victory in New Hampshire. Last summer and fall, hesitancy, "policy," and dissension characterized the Republican party, as boldness, earnestness, and harmony did the Democracy, and we were victorious everywhere. Since October and November the picture has everywhere been reversed. Unity and audacity again characterized the Republicans, and timidity and policy the Democrats. The senatorial election in Ohio, the senatorial election in Kentucky, the refusal of the Maryland Legislature to re-elect Senator Thomas when denied his seat, the triumph of the New York World politicians in the National Democratic Committee, the inaction of the Ohio Legislature, and various other similar circumstances, indicate that the Democratic party just now is not the "unterrified Democracy" of Old Hickory's time.—Dayton Ledger.
