STRANGE DISEASE AMONG HORSES .-About 8,000 horses-one third of the whole number in the city-are now afflicted with a new disease, which has been termed, for want of a better name, "pink eye," because it first appears in the horses' eyes, which become watery and inflamed. The disease is a kind of influenza, and bears a great resemblance to the epizooty, which swept over the country from ocean to ocean during the winter of 1872 3. The disease is rapidly spreading, but it is not as fatal in its effects as the epizooty. The stablemen seem to have combined to keep the people in ignorance of the existence of the malady. It showed itself here about four weeks ago. It is known to be in nearly all of the large cities of the Union. Its exact nature is unknown, and its origin as profound a mystery as that which surrounded the epizooty. The veterinary surgeons are studying patch and at very reasonable rates.
