The last census reported only one Chisamen in the state of Vermont, two in Delaware, nine in Virginia, ten in North Carolina, eleven in Alabama and Maryland, thirteen in Virginia, fourteen in South Carolina, and only 7386 in all the states and territories east of the Rocky mountains.

About three-fourths of the 200,000 lbs. of grain shipped from the Willamette to Fort Klamath has already been taken from Ashland by the Indian teamsters. Many of the teams have been coming in by the Rogue river road, and bringing loads of lumber from Aiken's saw mill to Ashland and Medford.

The population of the principal towns in Oregon, as given by Polk's Oregon, Washington and Idaho "Gazette," is as follows: Portland, 40,000; East Portland, 8,000; Astoria, 6,000; Salem, 6,000; The Dalles, 4,000; Pendleton, 2,500; Baker City, 2,300; Corvallis, 2,000; Albany, 1,725; Eugene City, 1,700; Ashland, 1,600; Roseburg, 1,500; Oregon City, 1,300; Jacksonville, 1,000.

The right of war party for the California & Oregon extension are now slashing through the forest of the Siskiyou country. According to present indications, the terminus of the line for the coming winter will be in Strawberry valley. If the weather is favorable the extension may be made to Butteville. Connection with the line from Portland is now promised to be made by next fall.

His examination was held Thursday before Judge Smith, and was bound over to await the action of the grand jury in the sum of \$6,000, on the charge of murder in the second degree. The Washington "Herald" publishes from what it asserts is unusually reliable authority, that about October 1st the Cabinet will be recast. Secretary Manning will resign. Bayard will take the Treasury Department, La nor will become Secretary of State, and Joe McDonald will be appointed Secretary of the Interior. The "Herald" says this is from a prominent bureau chief who knows what he is talking about.

According to surveys recently made by W. F. Brizes, the distance from Canyonville to Crater lake is 73 miles. Mr. Brizes estimates the cost of constructing a wagonroad at \$12,500. His survey gives the altitudes of prominent points as follows: Canyonville, 793 feet; crossing at forks of South Umpqua river, 1,000 feet; main divide between Umpqua and Rogue rivers, 3,380 feet; at the rim of Crater lake, 7,000 feet.

Mr. Atchison, Superintendent of Construction of the Meckay-Bennet Telegraph between Roseburg and San Francisco, is in Portland. He reports rapid progress on his end of the line and he is pushing work with his characteristic energy. Mr. McDugal, who has charge of construction from New Westminster, B. C., to Roseburg, is also in that city. The same activity prevails on his division, and Portland will soon be reached.

Parties from the Mad River section furnish additional information regarding the killing of Geo. Erickson, which turns out to be, as at first supposed, a cold blooded murder. He was shot in the back, from ambush, by some person unknown, although parties who are suspected are now being trailed by Sheriff Bowie. It is hoped by all good citizens that those who are guilty of this dastardly murder may be found and punished to the full extent of the law. -Trinity Journal.

Charley Smith, brother of Capt. Smith, of "The Three Sisters," well known in this city, committed suicide at his home at Salem last Sunday evening and died Monday afternoon. The act was performed with a case knife and morphine. At the same time Smith attempted to kill one of his children, who was present but failed. He had been drinking hard, and that was the matter. Few though who knew him, would consider him guilty of such a crime even when intoxicated. -Albany Democrat.
