

The European Crops.

Europe is seriously alarmed about her growing crops, and it is evident that in many sections they will prove failures. In England all hope of the crops is entirely gone. The rain has been so excessive as to have destroyed any lingering hope that there might have been, and the result is a dullness in the markets and on change that is almost painfully distressing. In France and Germany the same state of affairs prevails, heavy rains having afflicted them as they have England. In this emergency, therefore, it is very evident that Europe must look to the United States for her supply of breadstuffs, and, fortunately, she will find as well prepared. Although the crop of this country is not so enormously abundant as it was last year, it is fair to estimate that it is fully two-thirds of an average crop. This will enable us to supply not only ourselves but Europe as well, and although it is hardly probable that many of the great fortunes that it is anticipated will be made in wheat will be realized still it is safe to assume that the foreign exports will average very high figures. It must not be lost sight of, however, that in Southern Russia the crops are as bountiful as in this country, and the land of the czar will, therefore, be a competitor with us in the European market. In the meantime, there has been intense suffering in the United States, and there are a few sections where the crops have been almost entire failures, so that we can sympathize with Europe in her want of the grain that has grown so plentifully with us.

New Constitution Party.

The San Francisco Chronicle says the New Constitution party of that State is now fairly in the field, and the most thoroughly organized political power that ever waged a campaign in California. Its State organization is strong and energetic, and is supported by County Central Committees, and 252 local Clubs scattered through all the counties of the State.

Granite Creek Mines.

From the Grant County News we glean the following pertaining to the mines: Mr. Sam Parrish spent several days in our city last week and this. He says that everything at Granite Creek is in a very good way, and they expect to have a lively camp there this fall. Each lead has been struck every day and all feel confident that the camp is bound to be one of the best on the coast. He says that the mill will soon be up and then something definite can be said as to how the mines there will pay.

MONUMENTAL.

The Besays: That is the name of the new town on Granite creek at the Monumental mine. A store has been opened by Messrs. Stiemme & Co. of this city. The Monumental company has a saw mill running, cutting 10,000 feet of lumber daily, and a brick yard in full operation. The mill is upon the ground, and eight men are employed in placing it in position and working about the mine. Monumental promises to be a live little town, and the mine promises to yield much bullion.

LAND.

A great many people in our county have given up the idea of waiting for the opening of the reservation to settlement, and have taken homesteads north of town, land that three years ago was considered worthless. Marked by hills and on either side you are met with the sage brush ground turned upward, and a good portion two foot high with the nicest kinds of growing grains. Fencing is progressing finely. Marked wire is sent to some extent. Let this good work go on; there is plenty of the land left, and in view of what this land can produce, it will be, in another two years, almost impossible to select a fair price for a homestead. For those who have energy and energy and are willing to go to work in earnest can soon make for themselves a valuable home. Young men, do not let this fine opportunity pass, but pull off your coat and go in; do not allow the attraction of the city to detain you.

The anniversary of the Umatilla county Bible Society was held at the Baptist church in Pendleton, Saturday, July 27th; J. M. Bentley, vice president of the Society in the chair. The Secretary, Mr. Guyer, read the minutes of the previous meeting. The Treasurer, Dr. J. M. Frost, read his report, which showed the receipts of the Society to be \$37 83. The disbursements were as follows: Paid for two blank books.....\$ 1 50 Freight on books from Portland 3 81 Commission on sales..... 99 "Og's Bible" by as a donation 9 35 " " " " for books..... 28 48 Bibles and testaments have been received during the year to the value of \$73 15; books have been sold to the value of \$46 86. The value of the books now in the Depository is \$26 17. The following persons were chosen as officers of the Society for the ensuing year: President, Rev. J. C. Kirkman; Vice-President, J. M. Bentley; Secretary, Dr. J. M. Frost; Treasurer, J. H. Raley; Executive Commissioners, Rev. W. H. Frost, Robt. Bruce and James Bowman, Sr. At the close of the business part of the meeting a short address on the Bible cause was delivered by P. O. Hetzler, District Superintendent for the American Bible Society. Mr. Hetzler held service in the morning at the M. E. Church. During the day \$19 75 were received in cash and subscription to the Bible cause. The books of the Society will be kept at the store of Messrs. Scott & Raley, where they may be obtained at cost prices by all who are able and desire to buy, and where they are not able to purchase, they may be supplied without money and without price. Polk County Items.

July 30, 1879. Ed. "E. O."-Since writing you last, we have had two or three days rain and almost a week of weather during which it was not raining, but cloudy mornings. On the 11th and 12th it rained exceedingly hard for July. There is complaints coming from various farmers that wheat is blighted, but as far as is known, in the neighborhood of this place there is an excellent crop. The following farmers have cut grain, in this neighborhood: W. H. Fulkerson has cut oats, Benj. Welte, oats, and Thos. Pearce, barley. Thousands of acres of fall wheat will soon be harvested. There was a pair of twin girls born to the wife of Mr. Wesley Cravens about the first of the month, the mother has been quite ill but at last accounts was improving. Blackberries and hazleuts are quite plentiful in some parts. We had two smoky days last week, during which it was very warm on Saturday and Sunday. The thermometer reached 84 deg. in the shade and 115 deg. in the sun on Sunday. Haying is going on in some parts still, but the greater portion of the farmers have finished. THE YELLOW FEVER SCOURGE.

The yellow fever scourge is raging with some severity in Memphis and New Orleans. A few isolated cases have occurred among the refugees from the above cities in Louisville and other cities along the Ohio. Many of the southern cities have been quarantined-notably Natchez and Shreveport. The authorities are putting forth every exertion in their power to prevent the spread of the dreaded pestilence, and it is to be hoped the sanitary measures which they are inaugurating may be productive of good. From a private letter we learn that three men were killed a few days ago in Yankee Fork. The affair is said to be the result of a quarrel. Our informant could not get the full particulars. The mines there produce quartz that pay to haul 30 miles. In Oregon, for the second quarter of 1879, there were fourteen failures, amounting to \$110,207, and for the first six months of 1879 there were twenty-three failures, amounting to \$184,721. Oregon's showing compares very favorably with States of equal proportions. "The Chinese must go," says Kearney. And they are going everywhere.
