ASSESSMENT.—The amount of assessment of Umatilla County is \$1,567,822. Poll tax collected by messenger, \$208. The county court levied a tax of 21 mills. State tax, 7 mills; school tax, 3 mills; county tax, 11 mills. This makes the county tax amount to \$17,946.56. Rather a small sum to run two counties on.
