STATE AND TERRITORIAL.

Arizona wants an appropriation for a Territorial penitentiary. \$100,000.

Hop culture is attracting a good deal of attention in Linn county.

Boats have resumed their regular trips on the Yamhill as far as Lafayette.

Clack County, W. T., is supporting about half-a-dozen paupers at present.

In Klickitat Valley, W. T., the snow is about one foot deep and the weather very cold.

A revival, under the auspices of the Baptist denomination, is in progress at Amity.

The game law, relative to the killing of deer, went into effect on the first of this month.

Grand preparations are being made for the anniversary ball at Albany on the 22d inst.

J. D. Brown, the escaped convict, was captured at Comstock on the evening of the 4th inst.

During 1874, the entire export of iron from Oregon to San Francisco amounted to 1,404 tons.

Olympia is once more enjoying frequent steamboat communication with the lower Sound.

Five head of cattle were frozen to death in attempting to cross the Snake river at the time it froze up, two weeks ago.

"Ten Nights in a Bar-Room" will be played at the entertainment to be given by the Independent Champions at Salem on the 17th inst.

The Grangers in the vicinity of Dayton have concluded to build this season a substantial and spacious ware-house for their own purpose.

The Independent Champions of the Red Cross are preparing to give a splendid entertainment at Salem on the evening of the 17th inst.

The City Fathers of Dallas City have been petitioned to pass an ordinance prohibiting boys from running through the city after 9 o'clock at night.

A road supervisor, residing at Sheridan, was recently tried before Justice Hembree at Lafayette, and fined \$50 for dereliction of duty in his district.

The Oregon Senate and House journals of the Oregon Legislature and the session laws, will be finished by the State Printer in about two weeks.

The freezing and thawing process that has been going on for the past two weeks has caused much damage to the fall wheat in Washington and Yamhill counties.

Rev. Mr. K. Hines, accompanied by a number of citizens of La Grande, visited Baker City on last Sunday to assist in dedicating the new M. E. Church recently completed there.

The reading school at Lafayette, on Friday evening of each week, grows in interest and popularity. Prof. Morey, will give a prize to the best reader on the next regular evening.

The Alden fruit-drying machine at Salem is attracting the attention of farmers and others. For a week past it has been visited by parties from almost every county in the State.

A letter from Prairie City, Grant county, to the Mountainer, says that the snow there is sixteen inches deep over the entire country, and that a large number of cattle will necessarily be lost.

The Circuit Court of Marion county meets on the fourth day in February, instead of the second Monday in March, as heretofore. The last Legislature passed a bill providing for the change.

The Tacoma saw mill has now been in running operation five years and three months, or since the first of November, 1869. During that period it has cut 60,000,000 feet of lumber, and sent away 110 cargoes.

The steamer Alice ran on a snag just above Buena Vista last week, and sank with about thirty-three inches of water in her hold. The snag penetrated the hull just under the boilers, making a huge hole. No freight damaged.

The Salt Lake Herald asserts that the Great Salt Lake is rising perceptibly year after year, and the mountain streams are increasing in volume. A large area of farming meadows and pasture lands have been submerged, and fence protection is taken off.

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The paper barrel business seems likely to amount to something. A manufacturer is being erected in Rochester which will turn out six hundred barrels a day. They are much lighter and more durable than wooden barrels.
