Loughery, stepped forward and answered for him, saying, "Nothing, your honor, except that he asked for the lightest penalty allowable, as he thought the circumstances in the case warranted. Judge Fullerton then proceeded to state that next to murder, the violation of female chastity was one of the most heinous under our statutes; but as his crime was not so flagrant as the commission of rape, but only of attempted rape, he would give him two years in the penitentiary."
