Contractor F. F. Patterson has completed the fine cement walk, which he has been laying on Douglas street, in front of the courthouse. He has done an exceptionally good job and one which will give good service for many a year to come.

The judge tours the county annually, inspecting work done on roads, bridges, etc., and carefully considers proposed improvements in various sections of the county.
