## RUMBLINGS FROM THE RAILROAD

Dan. Fortin, formerly located here, but now looking after S. P. matters elsewhere has had his Plainesdealer changed from Silvertown to Harrisburg.

The shipping of turkeys the past week has been no small item. Already one firm sent 8,000 pounds of dressed birds to Tacoma and another sent 30,500 of the same article to Seattle, with others to be heard from. Two large shipments were made to Oakland, this county, where they will be re-shipped. Each year this industry has been growing until now it has reached large proportions.

Conductor Renfro has been running a wood train, manned with Japanese, bringing the fuel from Rice Hill and Leadore, in large quantities for use in the local yards. Foreman Tolson had the Japs in charge and they are paid off with checks, like other employees.

Heretofore a special rate of one and one-third has been allowed for the Thanksgiving season, but thus far no orders for such a reduction have been received at the local office.

Having run out of cement, Foreman Mahoney and his "concrete gang" have been transferred to Eugene, where they will proceed to put in foundations for a water tank and also for a "Pogue Water Column." Foreman O. Jones is now in charge of the work on the new round house and he will now proceed to drive about 200 piling which will be put down to some depth and then the concrete will be placed on top, making most excellent foundation for the eight engine pits which are in course of construction. There still remains about 500 yards of concrete to go in, before the work along that line is done. This will give Roseburg one of the finest and best equipped round houses to be found anywhere in the country.

Some of the men in and around the local yards are said to have run up against the process known to the craft as "tin canning." In other words it is reported that they have been imbibing too freely of that which intoxicated, and now they are out of a job.

Passenger conductor L. B. Hendricks has been called to California by sickness in his family. Conductor A. J. Rissely is filling his place.

Assistant superintendent, O. W. Taylor, has been up from Portland, looking up the local situation, for a few days. Tom Elliott, commercial agent and Wm. Lord, route agent of the Wells-Fargo Express Co., came up from Frisco, to look after the shipping of turkeys by express, and they sent out one car from this city, to Seattle and two from Oakland, to San Francisco, by the express route and this was well worth their while, for it represented "good money."

Passenger brakeman Geo. Reed has been transferred to Portland, where he will do extra work, for a while.
