OUR BIG DAY.

One great day for Marshfield has come and gone; but is gone only to be replaced by others big with rich promise not only for our local community but for Oregon.

It is but fair to say that the success that attended Tom Richardson's effort to raise money to advertise the Coos Bay Country was no surprise to those who have heretofore had the opportunity of testing the generosity of the citizens of Marshfield upon other occasions.

The true significance, however, which attends the raising of a fund of \$4,000 solely lies in the purpose for which it is to be used. This fund will enable Marshfield to secure the exclusive services of a "skilled publicity man." We cannot have a Tom Richardson for "for men of his type extremely scarce." But we can have a man trained in the business and it is special knowledge along this line that we need. And through the employment of such a man we are assured of getting value received for the money that will be spent in the interest of the public welfare.

There is however, another result that will follow the employment of a paid secretary for the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, and which agreeably affects the contributors to the fund. Under the old plan of attempting to provide for the public weal through the united efforts of the business and professional men of the community, there was no individual responsibility and the result has been that many important matters have not received the proper attention; or if they have been attended to at all, it has been at the sacrifice of valuable time on the part of more than one, and sometimes of four or five of our citizens. From first to last, all of the active business men of Marshfield have been called upon "to spend" some time in the performance of public duties.

It is not an exaggeration to say that every contribution to the fund raised yesterday, will be money in the pocket at the end of the year, in the time that will be saved him in the performance of these public duties by the single individual who by reason of his skilled knowledge and special aptitude can more effectively dispatch the business.

Robinson fell heavily to the floor and sustained a fracture of skull. He died before a physician could reach the resort.
