Master Fish Wardens Monthly Report

To the Honorable Board of Fish Commissioners, Salem, Oregon.

Gentlemen:—Arrests and prosecutions during the month for violation of the laws pertaining to the Fishing Industry have been as per the following:

District No. 1.

June 1st, 1907, Deputy Warden "Brown" filed complaints in the LaGrande Justice Court against Stillwell & Co. and W. B. Smith, marketmen of LaGrande, for dealing in salmon without license. Messrs. Stillwell & Co. entered a plea of guilty and were fined \$50 and costs, which they paid. The case against W. B. Smith was dismissed upon motion of the District Attorney, inasmuch as the evidence furnished was insufficient to show that he was handling salmon fish, or that he had been handling fish.

June 4th. Upon information furnished by Walter Balliff, W. A. Mack; Wm. Mortenson, of Mt. Angel, was arrested for dumping sawdust into Butte Creek. Upon being arraigned before Justice Stipp, of Oregon City, Mr. Mortenson entered a plea of guilty, whereupon he was fined \$50 and costs, which he paid.

June 15th. Deputy Warden Brown filed complaints in the St. Helens Justice Court against the Patterson Lumber Co. and the Oregon-Kansas Lumber Co., two milling concerns of Rainier, for allowing sawdust to be dumped into the waters of the Columbia River. June 25th the Patterson Lumber Co. appeared in court and entered a plea of guilty, whereupon a fine of \$50 and costs was imposed, which they paid. The Oregon-Kansas Lumber Co. appeared in court June 29th, and entered a plea of guilty, whereupon a fine of \$50 and costs was imposed, which they paid.

Deputy Warden "Brown" and Walter Balliff "Settem," in the Oregon Patrol, made the following arrests and seizures:

June 21st. C. E. Thorp, of Ridgefield, Washington, was arrested for fishing in the Columbia River without license. Upon being arraigned in the St. Helens Justice Court, the same day, Mr. Thorp entered a plea of guilty, whereupon he was fined \$50 and costs, which he paid.

June 21st. Two set-net and about five hundred (500) feet of sturgeon line were found in the waters of the Willamette slough in a condition to take salmon and sturgeon, this being the Close Season period for the Willamette River and all of its tributaries, said named gear was seized and confiscated.

June 22nd. Andrew Pederson, of Skamokawa, Washington, was arrested for fishing salmon in the Columbia river with a gill-net without properly numbering his net and boat. Upon being arraigned in the Astoria Justice Court, June 24th, Mr. Pederson entered a plea of guilty whereupon he was fined \$10 and costs, which he paid.

June 29th. Complaints were filed in the Astoria Justice Court against E. J. Clayton, Peter Ulfers and I. C. Bjorge, three fishermen of Westport, Oregon, found fishing for salmon in the Columbia River, with gill-nets, without properly numbering their nets and boats.

Hatchery Operations.

We have succeeded in collecting a fine lot of Spring Chinook Salmon in the Clackamas river below the dam at Cazadero, and it now looks very much as though we were going to be able to retain them in a healthful condition. It is early yet to be sure on that score but they appear to be contented with their confinement, and if nothing serious happens in the meantime and their spawn matures properly, we should get a good lot of eggs during the spawning period.

Reports from the McKenzie River Hatchery go to show that we are again this year getting a fine lot of Spring Chinook Salmon in that stream and that we will be successful in trapping and holding a large percentage of them for spawning purposes.

Patrol Boat.

The gasoline patrol boat, built especially for patrol work amongst the fisheries on the Columbia and its tributaries, by R. M. Leathers, contractor of Astoria, was finished complete according to contract entered into March 7th, 1907, for the building and equipping of said boat, and on June 15th, 1907, the date specified under said contract for the completion thereof, it was duly accepted by Water Bailiff Ole J. Settem, superintendent in charge of the construction. Immediately thereafter, the boat was placed in commission and taken to the Willamette river, in charge of Water Bailiff

Settem and Deputy Warden Brown, for the purpose of looking after the Close Season period, which began June 15th for that stream and its tributaries. After matters on the Willamette were attended to, the boat was taken to the lower Columbia and its presence amongst the fisheries of those waters is very noticeable.

June 13th. Received from Justice of the Peace Levy Stipp of Oregon City, one-third of fine imposed against R. C. Worthington, of Oswego, May 2nd, 1907, for fishing a set-net in the waters of the Willamette river without numbering the same; \$3.33.

June 13th. Received from Justice of the Peace Levy Stipp of Oregon City, one-third of fine imposed against Wm. Mortenson of Mt. Angel, June 4th, 1907, for dumping sawdust into Butte Creek; \$16.67.

June 22nd, 1907. Received from W. H. Powell, Deputy District Attorney, St. Helens, one-third of fine imposed against C. E. Thorp, June 21st 1907, in the St. Helens Justice Court, for fishing for salmon in the Columbia river without a license; \$16.67.

June 24th. Received from Justice of the Peace Goodman, Astoria, one-third of fine imposed against Andrew Pederson, June 24th, 1907, for fishing with a gill-net in the waters of the Columbia river for salmon without numbering his boat and net, \$3.33.

June 25th. Received from W. H. Powell, Deputy District Attorney two-thirds of fine imposed June 25th 1907, in the St. Helens Justice Court against the Pederson Lumber Co., of Rainier, for allowing sawdust to be discharged into the waters of the Columbia river June 15th, 1907; \$33.33.
