FIGHT AGAINST THE GREEKS TO BE PUSHED

Federal Officials Will Push the Cases Against Greek Padrones.

Chicago, Oct. 7.—With more than 20 cases against Greeks who are charged with violations of the immigration laws now ready for presentation to the federal grand jury next week, Assistant District Attorney Seward S. Shirer and Immigration Inspector A. A. Seraphic will endeavor through the agency of the grand jury inquiry, to bring to a climax their fight against the padrone system in Chicago, which has been for several months the subject of investigation.

It is expected that the Greek investigation will take up three days next week, beginning Tuesday. Indictments are expected in all cases to be presented.

All prosecutions will be based on evidence showing that the men to be prosecuted brought children to the United States from Greece under false representations, making false affidavits to the effect, in most cases, that the imported aliens were sons or daughters, when they were not of kin. The most flagrant cases have been those of the proprietors of the bootblack stands.
