POINTS FOR FRUIT GROWERS

M. G. Pohl Makes Some Valuable Suggestions on Pruning.

Pruning in Coos county should be done from November to the later part of February.

In pruning trees, whether the owner does it himself or hires the work to be done, the following rules must be observed:

Avoid as much as possible, and only for good reasons, to cut large limbs; never cut the center or heart of the tree; each and every cut must be made carefully and close up to the body from which it is separated. Allow no breaking or tearing about of the bark or leave-splinters to remain. The best way is to saw first on the lower side, then finish from the opposite side.

From two limbs crossing one another one may have to be taken out or one of the two must be trimmed so as not to touch the other. Always select the head from which you desire the new limb to grow; never allow stubs of limbs even one-half inch to remain; cut close. All those stubs will dry, become dead, rot and disease the tree; the bark will never grow over, but when cut close will heal over and form healthy bark.

Plan how you desire to shape your trees. The preferable style would be a gobular top with the first limbs about five feet from the ground. This will give you and your horses room to plow and cultivate close up to the trunk without danger of breaking the limbs. Have all trees of your orchard pruned alike in shape; old trees should not be higher than 25 feet.

Occasionally walk around the tree you are working on and watch that you do not cut holes or spurs without limbs. See that the crown or body of the tree is well balanced.

Last year's growth should be cropped nearly one half or one third of the new growth.

Water shoots growing up from the roots must all be cropped out, and if growing from the limbs, with the exception of such to fill a space or form a needed limb; the balance must all be removed.

With an old hoe scrape off all the moss and rough bark; particularly such found between the forks of limbs. There is where the insects remain over winter.

Whitewash with lime the trunk and lower part of limbs; if you do this the first steps to your benefit has been taken.
