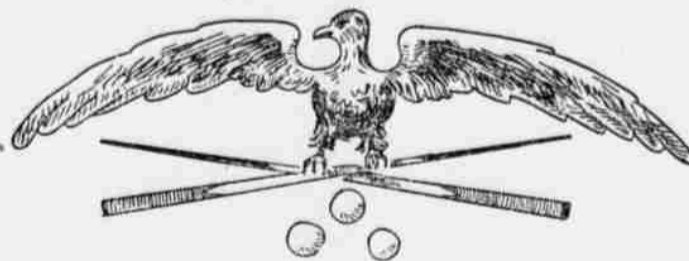

the peninsula that divides upper and lower Coos Bay, and the spirit of this friendly message to all other cities on the Pacific coast is the spirit best calculated to carry the splendid possibilities of Coos Bay to magnificent fulfillment.

"We need San Francisco and Portland and Seattle and they need us," cry the builders of Coos Bay. "We said each other, instead of hindering, and because Portland, the metropolis of that mighty artery of inland commerce, the Columbal river is great and must grow, Coos Bay must become of world-wide importance also. Portland needs Coos Bay, just as New London needs Liverpool, just as Paris needs Marseilles."

Such is the feeling of Coos Bay toward its neighboring ports and cities, in marked contrast to the narrow, short-sighted and selfish spirit of jealousy and belittling too frequently manifested in the attitudes of other cities of the northwest toward each other. Furthermore, in addition to this broad and sound basis of fine generosity and helpfulness toward the outside world, Coos Bay has a local spirit founded upon the same principle, and because of this is getting splendid results from "the long pull, the strong pull, and the pull together."

The Coos Bay exploitation system is bringing hundreds of letters of inquiry from homeseekers all over the country, and following the letters the homeseekers themselves are flocking to Coos Bay and finding the climate, the fruitfulness of the soil, the growth industries and the opportunities open to brain, brawn and capital, just as represented.

Development, not "boom," is the aim of the Coos Bay builders, and nothing is exploited except what Coos Bay can actually "make good" upon.

Advertisers and speculators are not wanted at Coos, and the appeal is to "people of the right sort, people who can work, and people who can do things." To back up this appeal, without counting upon the practically unlimited opportunities of Coos county's other products, the lumber interests alone, according to a prominent and conservative lumberman, are worth 30,000 people to Coos Bay in the next five years, and it is said the coal deposits are worth 30,000 more.
