

EXTERMINATION OF RATS

The City of Marshfield will pay 5 cents each for all Rats delivered to the City Marshal.

This is being done for the protection of the health of Coos Bay. There is a possibility that Bubonic Plague may appear in this community and if such a misfortune should occur, shipping interests will be materially interfered with. Not only that, but loss of life would follow. The best method of preventing introduction and spread of the Plague is to destroy the Rats. Bubonic Plague is a disease of the Rat. The infection is transmitted by the Flea. The Flea lives on the Rat. If the Rat has Bubonic Plague, the Flea becomes infected. If the infected Flea bites a human being, that person becomes infected with Bubonic Plague.

The Rats in San Francisco are known to be infected, and it is not improbable that some of those Rats may be brought to Coos Bay. When warm weather comes, the Fleas will become more numerous and the danger of the spread of Bubonic Plague will be great.

Therefore, I ask the people of Marshfield to earnestly co-operate with the City Council in the work of exterminating the Rats.

It is Your Duty:

To trap and poison Rats; to have your premises inspected and obey the sanitary laws of the City. You should use every means possible for destroying the food supply of Rats.
