

COUNCIL MEETS THURSDAY CONSIDER STREET PAVING

Important Action Taken at Last Night's Meeting of City Fathers.

**STREETS AND SEWERAGE
IMPORTANT PROBLEMS**

Will Hold a Joint Conference With Property Owners and Taxpayers.

The Marshfield city council will hold a special meeting Thursday evening to consider ways and means for paving the business streets of the city. It is contemplated that this meeting will be a joint conference with property owners on Front street and other streets in the business center which are so greatly in need of improvement. This and a decision to push the work on the sewerage system in South and West Marshfield were the two most important actions of the council at the regular meeting in the city hall last evening.

All the members of the council except H. Lockhart who is out of the city were present when Mayor Straw called the body to order.

An ordinance giving notice of intention to establish grades on G. I. Fifth and Fern streets was passed; also on Oregon avenue, H. street, Miriam street, Ohio and Nevada avenues.

A largely signed remonstrance against the proposed improvements on Miriam street was presented and on this showing the council decided to abandon these improvements for the present.

Bills Allowed.

The consideration of bills was then taken up the largest ones ordered paid being \$163.65 cents to the Pioneer Hardware Co., \$160 to Masters & McLain for extra street work on Pennsylvania avenue and \$30.00 to the same firm for extra street work on Broadway.

In the consideration of the Pioneer Hardware Co's bill Mayor Straw enlivened the monotony of the routine proceedings with the only joke of the session by remarking that the bills for a siren fire whistle were almost as high as the sound of the whistle, the bill for installing the whistle after receiving it being over \$70.00.

Another electric light was ordered installed at the corner of H. street and Laurel avenue in South Marshfield.

More Sewers Needed.

Health Officer Dr. Mingus was present and delivered an earnest talk to the council on the necessity of hurrying the work of sewer construction in South and West Marshfield. He said this was of great importances as a number of cases of infectious diseases had developed in those sections as a direct result of poor sewerage. City Engineer Sandberg was called upon and said he would have all his sewer plans and designs for South Marshfield ready for presentation to and consideration of the council at its next regular meeting on Monday evening.

Better Streets Needed.

Alderman Sacchi then took the floor and said that without minimizing the importance of the sewer work the importance of the improvement of the business streets must not be overlooked. He stated it as his belief that the condition of Front street had driven people away who came to Coos Bay with the intention of locating and were disgusted and discouraged with the appearance of the main business street of the city. He said that the time had passed for talk and it was now time for action. As a result of his earnest plea the special meeting of the council on Thursday evening was decided upon. The matter of employing an ex-

pert accountant to straighten the city books and arrange a system of accounting was taken up and resulted in an agreement that definite action will be taken at the regular meeting next Monday evening.

The council then adjourned.
