## BEER PROMOTES Temperance

Recognized as a Food Product, and so dealt with by the Government

It is being recognized the world over that the drinking of beer promotes temperance and sobriety to a far greater extent than all the prohibition laws on the statute books. The latest British life insurance reports show that the ratio of death rate among abstainers is thirty per cent greater than among moderate drinkers. Beer is pure and wholesome, and the day is not far distant when it will be as much a part of the daily subsistence of every family as are milk, bread and other food necessities.
