WILL IMPROVE THE RAILWAY

Extensive Work Now Underway on Line to Coquille and Myrtle Point.

Extensive improvements in the railroad between Coos Bay, Coquille and Myrtle Point are now underway and when completed will mean that the line has been practically rebuilt. Upwards of \$30,000 have been expended for work already done and a large sum more will be required to complete the work projected.

The road is being rebalanced, the track in the low places being raised and new trestles and bridges put in. It was the first thought to raise the track in the Coquille valley above the high water line but this was found impossible. However, it will require unusually high water to affect it henceforth.

Superintendent C. J. Mills of the C. B. R. & E. Ry. and Nav. Co., is anxious to get the road in the best possible shape as early as possible. There has been gossip to the effect that the road would extend its line further north into the business section of Marshfield this summer, perhaps doing this by removing the coal chute along the bay north of the depot and using the place for a road bed and moving the depot to near what is now the north end of the chute. However, it is officially learned that no arrangements have been made for this.

MANY WOULD TRY FOR OIL NEAR HERE.

Large Number of Land Owners Around Coos Bay Have Disccovered Traces of Oil.

Since announcement was made that land near Coos Bay would be drilled for oil many people who once were interested in oil prospects are reviving their belief that petroleum is to be found here in paying quantities and there are reports from several directions that prospecting parties are becoming more and more convinced. Should machinery be brought here for prospecting, other parties are planning to organize for investigating several prospects which seem to promise well.
