Start New Road.—County Surveyor Cathcart today began work on the new Flagstaff road, establishing grades and doing other preliminary work. The grading will be done around via Bay Park.

Lawyers to Coquille.—Nearly all of the Coos Bay attorneys returned to Coquille today to be in attendance at the regular term of Circuit court which opened Friday. Most of them will remain there all week.

To Resume Ladies' Nights.—The North Bend Commercial club is arranging to resume the Ladies' Nights' which proved so popular last year. The date of the first will be announced as soon as the program is prepared.

Play Ball.—The Western baseball team defeated the Southern team by a score of 5 to 4 Saturday afternoon. The feature of the game was the home run made by Keith and Johnson's pitching. The Western team now challenges any boy's club in this section.

H. M. Cake Coming.—Word was received here late today that H. M. Cake, the Republican nominee for United States senator, will be on Coos Bay tomorrow. While no definite arrangements have been made, it is expected that Mr. Cake will make at least one public address here, probably taking Statement No. 1 as his theme.

Rush North Bend School.—Abraham Van Zile and Superintendent A. G. Raab as representatives of the North Bend school board are making a tour of Oregon cities to secure ideas for the new \$40,000 school building at North Bend. They will be absent about two weeks. Norman Jackson, the four-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Jackson of North Bend, died late Saturday of pneumonia. About a week ago, the little fellow was taken ill of whooping cough and had such a severe case of it that he was unable to withstand pneumonia which developed Thursday. He became so ill that Friday and Saturday, until his death, he suffered frequently from convulsions. The funeral services were held at the Presbyterian church Sunday, the Rev. J. E. Burkhart officiating. Six small boys of the Presbyterian Sunday school, classmates of the deceased, were the pall bearers. Burial was at Marshfield. The floral tributes were numerous and beautiful. In addition to the bereaved parents, a brother and a sister survive.
