He called attention to the fact that Minnesota and Oregon had been admitted to the Union together fifty years ago. The great distance that separated Oregon from the world's market had prevented its development but Minnesota being in the path of the growth of the United States had profited thereby. He said that the next twenty-five years was certain to see a greater development in Oregon than the last twenty-five years had witnessed in Minnesota.
