PLANS FOR FINE HARBOR.

Portland Men Start Campaign For Improvements.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 27.—Portland will have one of the finest harbors in the world, providing plans now being prepared for various improvements in the Willamette river by Engineer J. B. C. Lockwood of the Port of Portland, and harbor master J. Speier, meet with the approval of the engineers of the United States War Department. Back of these men, it is said, the Port of Portland Commission stands ready and willing to do anything within its power to carry out the stupendous improvements suggested.

It is proposed to dredge an immense basin for the anchorage of ships and a new channel west of Swan Island. In this basin, facilities will be provided so that all large seagoing vessels may anchor when not loading or unloading a cargo, and be removed from all the inconveniences and dangers of standing in the main and much-traveled channel of the river, which, in winter, is swept by the high winds. It will also remove them from all the small river craft and the large log rafts which at times become a menace to ships anchored, as such craft and rafts will not be permitted to travel near the anchorage basin, but take the channel to the east of the island.

It is also proposed to cut a channel along the entire west shore of Swan Island for the purpose of straightening the river at that point. This will give a straight course of vessels coming and going through the immense draw of the North Bank bridge across the Willamette. This will not only shorten the distance for vessels coming to Portland, but it will also eliminate the dangers which lurk in the narrow, swift and crooked channel to the east of Swan Island, and will give all boats a straight course in which to pass through the draw of the bridge.

Inspects Ranches.—Mrs. S. A. Yonkum, Coos county dairy inspector, returned today after having inspected thirty-six ranches in the vicinity of Myrtle Point and Catching Inlet. Generally she found the ranchers ready to comply with the new state laws, but a few were obstinate. She insists that the law be lived up to the letter and is glad to see that most of the ranchers appreciate the fact that they will in turn derive benefit from the new regulations.

Roads Are Good.—Judge John F. Hall and Commissioner E. Anderson returned today from the Coquille valley where they have spent the last week inspecting the county roads. They say that the roads generally are in fairly good condition, better than they anticipated and that the work now in progress will put them in good shape. A large bridge is to be constructed near Bandon.

Many Go to Bandon.—A large party of Marshfield people went to Bandon today to aid in the installation of a local lodge of the Degree of Pochontas there this evening. The Order is an auxiliary to the Redmen which has a flourishing tribe there and the new lodge will start with a large charter membership. Geo. Farrin, Great Sachem of Oregon, will have charge of the degree work tonight. Among the others who went from here are Mrs. Reeder, Mrs. Wieder, Mrs. Seaman, Mrs. Owens, Mrs. Daly, Mrs. Farrin and Mrs. Hugh McLain. They will probably return on the baseball excursion from Bandon to Coos Bay tomorrow.

Plans For Prospect Avenue.—The Prospect avenue property owners will meet at the office of Justice C. A. Pennock this evening to devise a suitable plan for improving the thoroughfare. A preliminary plan has been devised and it is believed that it will be adopted. The plan is to grade only thirty-eight feet of the sixty feet width of the street, then plank twenty-four of this for a roadway, put in a gutter on each side of this a foot wide and then put in sidewalks on each side six feet wide. The remaining twenty-two feet of the street, eleven feet on each side is to be left to the property owners for the time being under provision by the city council that they shall clear it and keep it in good condition, or in other words park it.
