AWAIT RETURN OF VON BULOW

Germany Will Not Name Baron Von Sternberg's Successor For Few Weeks.

(By Associated Press.)

BERLIN, Aug. 25.—The Foreign office sent a cablegram to Count Hermann Von Hatzfeld-Wildenburg, the German charge d'affaires at Washington, instructing him to inform President Roosevelt that the question of a successor to Baron Von Sternberg probably would not be settled until the second week in September after the return of Prince Von Bulow.

SHOCK TO WASHINGTON.

Baron Von Sternberg Was Close to Roosevelt.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—The news of the death of Baron Von Sternberg came as a great shock to personal and official friends in Washington. When he left Washington, May 15, for his home in Germany, the ambassador himself seemed to give those close to him a premonition that he never would return. He was one of the most popular and highly esteemed members of the diplomatic corps in Washington. The Baron, Roosevelt, Adee and Pinchot formed a quartet of very close friends, and spent much time together. The Baron and Roosevelt had an intimate relationship and had much in common and frequently rode together, and the Baron was always a welcome guest at the White House. The immediate cause of Von Sternberg's death was inflammation of the lungs.
