Leave For Eureka.—The Eureka sailed from Coos Bay for Eureka today carrying J. Mynette, A. Linn, Mrs. Mary Garrett, A. L. Russell, R. L. Woodhouse, A. W. Barnum and E. A. Snodgrass and wife from Coos Bay.

Kaufman Deputy Recorder.—City Recorder J. M. Upton today appointed G. W. Kaufman deputy city recorder to fill the place made vacant by W. F. Squire who retires to look after his private affairs. Mr. Kaufman is well known and his appointment will undoubtedly meet with general favor.

Brings Fine Dog.—Harlan Peyton, who came down from Spokane with his mother yesterday to make his home with his sister, Mrs. J. M. Blake, while attending school here brought with him one of the finest dogs ever brought to the Bay. The dog is named "Prince" and is of the famous Chesapeake Bay breed.

George E. Weaver, the only son of the deceased, was present, having arrived yesterday morning from San Francisco.

Trouble at Coquille.—John D. Goss has returned from Coquille where he was called yesterday to take part in the case of Tupper vs. Tupper before Justice Holden. The case is a controversy growing out of the sale of the hotel at Coquille and rival claims as to the ownership of certain goods. A change of venue was taken from Justice Holden's court to the court of the Myrtle Point Justice.

Ferguson, a graduate of Leland Stanford University, who has been elected principal of the new Marshfield High School. The two will then make a tour of California cities, visiting schools and school men there, and later return up through the Willamette valley on a similar mission. The object of the trip is to get ideas for the new Marshfield school so as to make it up-to-date in every particular.
