NAME MEN TO WORK FOR PORT

MARSHFIELD CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ARRANGES FOR ACTIVE CAMPAIGN FOR BETTERMENT OF HARBOR.

I. S. Kaufman, I. S. Smith and G. W. Carleton have been named as a committee of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce to confer with the North Bend Commercial club relative to the engaging of a committee to arrange for the organization of the Port of Coos Bay. The Marshfield committee is desirous of having Francis H. Clarke as one of the members of the committee owing to his familiarity with the project. The North Bend club will consider the matter Wednesday night. It is proposed to turn the matter over to the committee to work out, including the submission of any law that may be required to the Oregon legislature at the session this winter.

Walter Lyon was engaged to gather data on the traffic to and from Coos Bay by water to furnish to the Oregon members of congress and to others that may aid in securing an appropriation for the harbor improvement.

In this connection, it was decided to wire Senator Fulton and other members to congress to ascertain what became of the special recommendation made by Col. Roessler through the United States engineering department for an appropriation of \$500,000 or so for the Coos Bay improvements. This was filed with congress early last summer.

It was also ordered that Gov. Chamberlain's attention be called to the resolution passed by the Oregon-Idaho Development congress here in August, requesting that he appoint a committee to draft such laws as may be required for the development of the rivers and harbors of Oregon. As Marshfield's representatives on this committee, he will be asked to name Francis H. Clarke.
