It was also ordered that Chamberlain's attention be called to the resolution passed by the Oregon-Idaho Development congress here in August, requesting that he appoint a committee to draft such laws as may be required for the development of the rivers and harbors of Oregon. As Marshfield's representatives on this committee, he will be asked to name Francis H. Clarke.
