Lamp Placed Back.

The small shed at the rear of the kitchen indicated that Mrs. Keating had been filling the lamp. A lamp that had been empty, according to Louis Keating's memery, was back on the shelf half filled. Whether she had been filling it and caused her clothes to eatch fire and extinguished the 'amn and n'accd it back on the shelf before extinguishing the fice in her clothing cannot be de-
