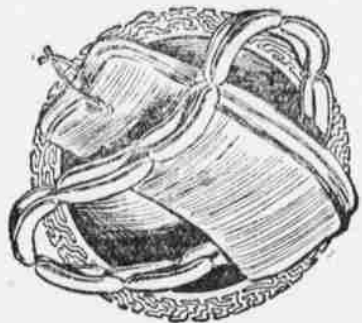

Dredge Does Good Work. — The dredge Oregon is now clearing the channel between the channel and the docks and is doing excellent work. The work is being watched by a large number and many compliments are being bestowed upon Capt. Peters and his crew for the fine service they are giving.

May Sail Saturday.—A message from Portland says the Breakwater will be unable to sail from there before Saturday evening. It is not certain that her rudder which was damaged while coming down the Columbia night before last, can be repaired by then, but Capt. Magenn hopes to be able to reach Coos Bay by Monday.

Accident at Mill.—Owing to an accident to the shafting at the C. A. Smith mill, the plant had to be closed down today. General Manager Oren stated that temporarily repairs would be effected so that they could start up tomorrow. It will be necessary to send away for some of the broken parts before the damage can be permanently repaired.
