**Ship Tanks On Barge.**—Yesterday, the big barge or ferry for the Western Pacific Railway Company for use on San Francisco bay, was towed out by the Redondo with five hundred oil tanks on board, empties being shipped back by the Coos Bay Oil and Supply Company.

**Wants Franchise.**—President W. U. Douglas of the Home Telephone Company, has presented an application to the Eastside city council asking for a franchise there. The matter will probably be brought up at the next meeting of that body. Sometime ago, before the local exchange was sold, Manager Robertson of the Pacific states, asked for a franchise in Eastside but no action was ever taken on his application. At present there is but one phone in Eastside and that is at the LaPalme store.

**Loses Spectacles.**—Tom Hall is mourning the loss of his spectacles. The loss is due to a balky engine on Tom's launch. Yesterday, he loaned the launch to Nels Rasmussen and a friend to make the trip to Haynes' Inlet. Three times they started and the engine balked, compelling them to row the craft back to the dock to get Tom's expert advice on how she ought to run. While leaning over to inspect the balky engine, the spectacle case and contents fell out of Tom's pocket and went straight to the bottom. However, Tom got the engine started so that Mr. Rasmussen at least got out of sight with the launch.

**Drill For Oil.**—J. M. Upton returned yesterday from a few weeks visit at the home of his parents in Langlois. He reports that the drilling for oil there has been resumed, a new outfit being brought in by the parties who started drilling a year ago, sufficient money being secured to make a perfect test of that field. He says that there is much feeling in that section over the action of the Portland syndicate which induced a large number of northern people to come in there through misrepresentations, the settlers being left holding the sack under great hardship. Mrs. Upton and children will remain there for a few weeks longer.

**Exhibits Oil.**—Prof. D. L. Diller of the United States Geological Survey, who is making a new and enlarged geological map of the Coos Bay field, today placed on exhibit at the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, specimens of the natural oil found in the various fields of the United States. The specimens are of the oil just

as it comes from the ground and the samples are from the Los Angeles, Orinda, Coalinga and Mt. Diablo in California, Belle Isle, La., Petrolia, Tex., Spring Valley, Wyo., and Greenfield and Caropolis, Pa. The specimens are of much interest owing to the possibility of oil being found here. Prof. Diller says that the pitch coal found in this vicinity is a certain indication that there is oil here, but whether it is here now can only be determined by sinking wells. Prof. Diller will not be able to complete his work here this summer, but will return next summer with an assistant. An assistant will join him here shortly.
