STRIKING WORKMEN AT MCKEE'S ROCKS, Pa., CAUSE SERIOUS TROUBLE.

It is estimated that 500 shots were fired last night and early today by the strikers and their sympathizers. The mob had gathered near O'Donovan bridge, near the works. The constabulary today took possession of the bridge and the efforts of the strikers to congregate were defeated.
