## FORM GRANGE AT COQUILLE

Cyrus H. Walker Organizes Ranchers There and Comes to Coos Bay.

COQUILLE, Ore., Aug. 30.—State Deputy Cyrus H. Walker of Albany, Oregon, organized Coquille Grange with thirty charter members in Coquille, Saturday. The charter was left open until Thursday, September 2 for additional names. The next meeting will be held at the Court House at 10 a. m. for taking in members and closing the charter. It is expected many more persons will come in.

Dairymen as well as farmers are interested in "boosting" the Grange. A movement is now on foot to have the next Congress reduce the tax on colored oleo margarine to 1 cent per pound. The National Grange had a hard fight to secure the present tax of ten cents per pound, and it will be the leading organization to fight any reduction of tax.

All the farming interests should work together, which can best be done through the Grange.

Mr. Walker has gone to Marshfield and will be there and in the vicinity to work up a Grange, returning to Coquille on time for the Thursday meeting, and Saturday will attend the Grange picnic to be held in a grove near Norway, where he will be one of the speakers.

Mr. Walker has had considerable experience organizing Granges. He has the distinction of having organized Banner Grange at Seio, Linn county, with a charter membership of 204, the largest list of any Grange west of the Mississippi river, and the second largest in the United States. He hopes to organize several new Granges and reorganize others while in Coos county.
